Democrats Seeking Primary Election For Presidents

Washington—(U.P.)—Fifty-three congressional Democrats urged their party Monday to support a "nationalwide presidential primary" so presidential candidates can be picked by the people instead of political conventions.

Leaders of the group said that would prevent a repetition of the "disgraceful events" at last week's GOP National Convention in which the issue of "stolen" delegates was raised.

The 18 senators and 35 House members petitioned the Democratic National Convention to include in the party platform a plank stating: "We pledge ourselves to the institution of a national presidential primary so that the people in both parties can select the presidential nominee."

The petitioners included one of the candidates for the Democratic presidential nominations, Sen. Estes Kefauver of Tennessee, who won most of the state primary preference primaries in which he entered. They also included campaign managers for two other candidates—Rep. Franklin D. Roosevelt Jr. (D-N. W.), chairman of the Averell Harriman-for-President Committee, and Sen. Ed C. Johnson (D-Colo.) who is spearheading the campaign of Sen. Richard Russell (D-Ga.).

Leaders of the move are Sens. Paul H. Douglas, Ill., and George A. Smathers, Fla., and Rep. Charles E. Bennett, Fla., all of whom unsuccessfully sponsored such legislation in the 82nd Congress.

Famed Maginot Line Target In East vs. West Cold War

Metz, France (U.P.)—France's Maginot Line, ill-starred memento of the nation's shattered dreams of peace, is back in the picture as a primary target in the East-West cold war.

Miles of flaking concrete pillboxes nestle against the once more strategic German frontier, resting like wounded veterans their rusting turrets in the sun.

Here and there a battle-worn French 75-millimeter artillery piece, rifling protected from weather with a fresh coat of grease, peeps from a pock-marked turret across fertile fields still strewn with grim rubble and souvenirs of the last great war.

Good Protection
The battered emplacements that the Germans never really breached have an added significance today. The three-foot thick reinforced concrete shielding the Maginot is rather good protection from all but the mightiest artillery or a very close strike by an atomic bomb.

The French have been reported reliably to be improving the Maginot Line. They probably have done a little. If the war in Indo-China didn't cost so much, probably they would be doing a lot more. A motorist can drive for a hundred miles through the multi-million dollar emplacements and never see a soldier.

"I wouldn't mind a bit being inside there if the Russians start-

ed shooting at me," one World War II veteran said. He pointed at the slits for machine guns covering a field of fire for miles.

The main German attack went north of the Maginot. The Germans, retreating in 1945, turned some of the heavy Maginot emplacements around, set up radar defenses and forced the allies to pay bitterly before the defenses fell.

Russians Aware
As the Communists give evidence, the Russians realize the Maginot's value and are doing their utmost to prevent the West from using the fortresses again.

"This must never be used again—down with the 18-months conscription." The party line signs are plastered in three-foot tall letters all over the huge fortresses where the Maginot snakes north through industrial France.

Herds of peaceful cattle graze contentedly over the forts where several divisions could be employed in case of another war.

"There are no soldiers now," a local farmer said, "but as you have noticed, the guns are oiled."

Oregon Hospitals Request \$1,418,061 In Federal Funds

Portland—(U.P.)—The Oregon State Board of Health announced that Oregon hospitals have made requests for federal aid amounting to \$1,418,061.

The requests have been submitted under the provisions of the Hill-Burton act.

The largest request was made by the Holladay Park hospital in Portland which asked for \$645,288 to help pay for building an addition.

The Salem General hospital asked for \$307,821 to build a maternity and pediatric unit, and the University of Oregon Medical School in Portland asked for \$147,586 to build a psychiatric ward in the new teaching hospital.

Other requests include: Valley View hospital at Ashland, \$233,336; Portland sanitarium, \$102,400; Salem Memorial hospital, \$89,466, and Rogue Valley hospital at Medford, \$65,500.

The Valley View hospital request from Ashland is for a proposed new hospital to be built by a recently-formed hospital district there. The "Rogue Valley hospital" request was submitted by a group of Medford doctors, which since has withdrawn the application.
