FRUIT JUICES STAIN MEAN TROUBLE
Grapefruit, orange juice, lemon juice—restful, refreshing morning pick-ups, yes sir!
But when the hand is shaky, or Buster grabs and spills the fruit juice in your lap—or maybe dribbles it over that new suit you just bought for him—then you got trouble.
Well, fruit juices—and by that we mean truly fresh as well as "fresh-frozen" and canned—fall into the category of "tannin-like" stains.
As you may know by now, they're the worst offenders when it comes to ordinary, everyday stains.
They penetrate into the very fibers of the fabric. Frequently they're invisible—until heat is applied. Then a brown spot appears. And they're a breeding spot for moths too.
So bear with us when we repeat once again:
IF THE GARMENT IS WASHABLE—sponge with clear water. Don't use soap. And don't iron unless absolutely sure the stain is out.
IF THE GARMENT IS DRY CLEANABLE—leave it alone. Don't rub or wipe, as this will cause it to penetrate deeper into the fibers of the fabric. Just let it dry, and bring it in to be cleaned... the sooner the better.
Fruit juices, being acid in content, require quick action because of their effect on dyes. If allowed to stay too long, not only will they affect the dye, but—through aging—they will become permanently fixed. And when that happens, another garment for which you paid good money can be consigned to the "around the house" category.
And, if you're like everybody we know, including ourselves, we have too many of those "around the house" garments already and not enough of the "Sunday Best."
So—to keep your clothes at their "Sunday best" longest—bring them to...

OSC Livestock Expert Due Here Tomorrow

Jim Ellings, livestock expert from Oregon State college, is scheduled to arrive in Medford Wednesday to complete the grading of bulls entered in the California Oregon Hereford Breeders contest, according to Earle Jossy of the agricultural extension office.

Most of the bulls were graded when Ellings was here a month ago, Jossy said. The breeders' program will culminate in an auction sale November 29.

Tuesday anticipated an early end of the 44-day-old steel strike and bid up industrial stocks to new highs since last Sept. 13.

The steel group firmed and featured in volume. Non-iron metals had some wide gains.
Building stocks moved ahead, notably the glass and cement shares. Oils had some wide gains on the belief that resumption of steel operations will hasten new well exploration.

Rails and utilities crept higher. Industrials monopolized the tape and sales increased to the best since July 2.

Dow-Jones preliminary closing stock averages: 30 industrials 276.76 up 1.68; 20 railroads 101.57 up 0.35; 15 utilities 49.67 up 0.05; and 65 stocks 106.21 up 0.48.

Sales Tuesday approximated 1,220,000 shares compared with 1,090,000 shares traded Monday.
