Unidentified Gunman Shoots Secretary

New York (U.P.)—An unidentified gunman invaded the offices of the American Physical Society at Columbia University Monday and shot to death a pretty, 20-year-old secretary.

The victim was Eileen Fahey who was murdered as she sat typing. Office workers were so stunned by the shooting that the assailant was able to walk out, take an elevator to the ground floor and disappear.

"I just shot a girl. Call the police," he told a passerby before he was swallowed up by the big city.

There was no evident reason for the shooting. Her brother was involved in a stabbing two weeks ago. Police were investigating to determine if there were any connection.

Clicquot Beverage Plant Opens Here

Clicquot Club beverages are now being produced by a local bottling company at 710 South Grape street, according to C. C. Bennett, western division sales manager for the Massachusetts company.

Bennett, a former Medford businessman and resident for five years, stated that the local bottling works has the franchise for bottling 10 kinds of the company's 23 flavors and is equipped with modern and efficient equipment.

Prior to 1938, the Clicquot company bottled all its products at the home plant in Millis, Mass., but changed this policy to a wide-spread local franchise basis, providing the local companies could meet certain standards, Bennett pointed out. The plant at Millis now serves only three states, Massachusetts, Rhode Island and Connecticut.

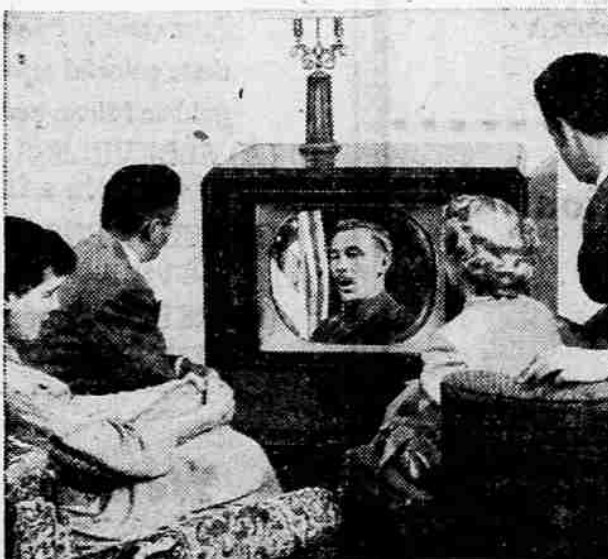

"LIVE" TV NOW SPANS THE WEST

New radio relay brings convention telecasts to all West Coast viewers

On July 7th, the Bell System's radio relay system and coaxial cables enabled the TV networks to bring the Republican Convention to the nation's television viewers—who will also see the Democratic Convention on July 21st. 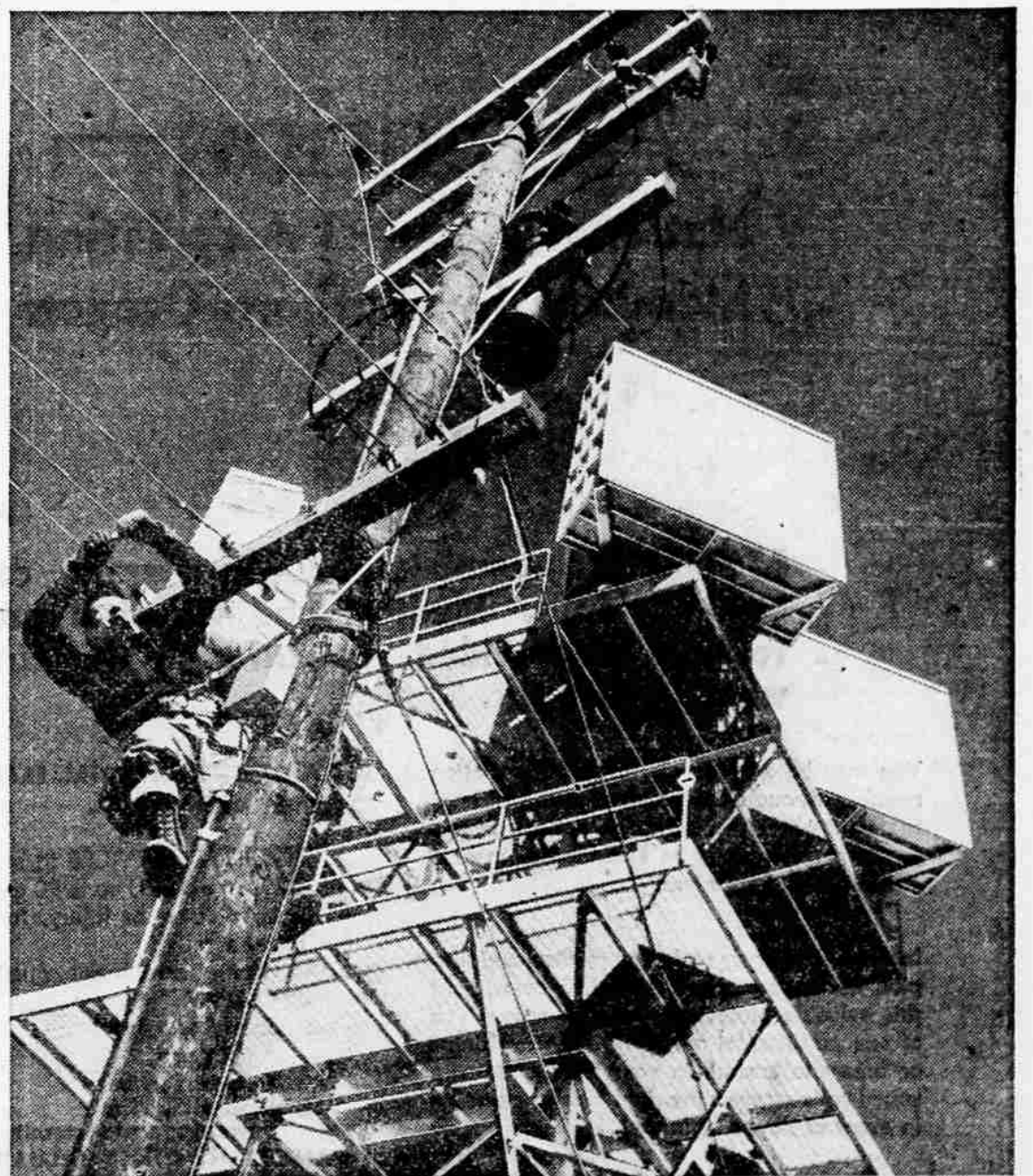
