Second National Broadcast Slated For Ashland Festival

To Install

Royal Neighbor Juvenile club will hold installation of officers Thursday, July 17, at the Pythian building at 8 p.m. Friends and relatives are cordially invited to attend.

Ashland — The Oregon Shakespearean festival will be on the air coast-to-coast again this year. A "live" broadcast will originate from the festival stage in Ashland August 16 at 3:30 p.m., Pacific standard time.

The 30-minute program will be heard over some 200 NBC sta-

tions across the country, featuring a description of the Rogue Valley, a discussion of the festival's unique methods of production, and 22-minutes from "Julius Caesar," one of the four plays in the festival's program this summer.

NBC broadcasts were inaugurated here last summer, and festival officials pointed out that it is the only event in Oregon commanding its own program on a national network.

The program will be produced by Andrew C. Love of Hollywood, one of the top NBC producers on the coast. Mr. Love directs "Short Story," "The Standard Hour," "Father Knows Best," and other popular shows for the network. Mr. and Mrs. Love, who were here last year, plan to spend their vacation in the valley and the program will be a "busman's holiday" for him.

The introductory portion of the broadcast will be in the form of an interview, with Angus Bowmer, festival producing director, and Dr. Margery Bailey of Stanford, academic advisor, participating. This section will be moderated by Jennings Pierce, general manager of KMED, Medford, long associated with NBC.

Although the program will be connected by direct wire to San Francisco studios and released over the network there, staff members of the valley affiliate, KMED, will handle much of the technical work, as well as announcing and production duties. Ray Johnson, chief engineer at the valley station, will engineer the show.

The script was prepared by William Dawkins of the festival staff.

The broadcast will be open to the public, but admission will be by ticket although no admission charge will be made. Procedure for securing tickets will be announced later.

was the youngest man to run for President of the United States.



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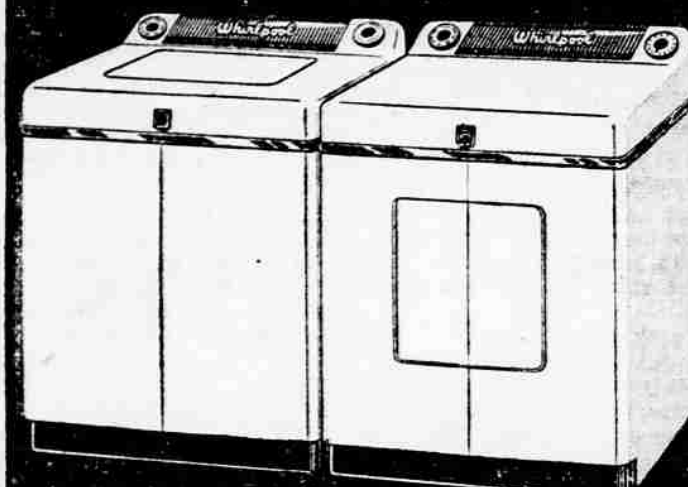
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
