Hollywood — U.P. — Clyde Jarman Jr., said Wednesday he's decided to retire from being a movie star and become a Tennessee doctor instead.

That town-headed youngster from "The Yearling" is a handsome 6 feet 2 inches now. But the 17-year-old would not be a doctor in Hollywood, he said. "I'll practice in Nashville. I wish I was back there now. I miss my friends. I just want to go back there and be one of them."

Next fall he'll be toting heavy books for pre-medical courses at Vanderbilt university in his home town of Nashville.

"I dunno, I guess I've always wanted to be a doctor," he drawled with a bashful grin.

Grandfather Was Doctor

"My grandfather was a country doctor. I used to go out on calls with him. We spent every summer with him in a little town called Bellbuckle in Tennessee."

Jarman elected to switch from the screen to stethoscopes after inspecting the short and often unhappy lives of the movie profiles.

"You just never can tell about this business," he reflected. "One day you can be on top, and the next, you're at the bottom."

Might Do Picture

"I like acting, it's easy and it's a lot of fun. If it works out, I might still do a picture now and then during my first two years in pre-med school. I could get a tutor to come to Hollywood with me, if there are any good parts I want to do."

"Acting is okay, but just as a sideline. I wouldn't want to depend on it."

Jarman is so popular an actor he doesn't have to stick around film ville to plug away at his career. He lives in Nashville and occasionally flies to Hollywood to be a movie star on his summer vacation. Last summer he didn't hear of any movies he wanted, so he stayed home to work in an ice cream factory.

"I'll go back to work there after I finish 'Fair Wind to Java' at Republic studio," he said.

Fine eatin' any summer day are fresh Corn Pancakes, stacked in threes and served with a pork sausage to go with each.

Off to a day in the out-of-doors? That calls for a he-man breakfast of fresh melon, golden-crust wheatcakes, sausages and coffee. When fresh corn kernels ramble through the cakes, your family will comment that summer eating is mighty good. It's mighty nutritious, too, since enriched flour brings protein, three B-vitamins and food iron to any dish. That's why corn Pancakes make such a good luncheon or supper dish, as well as breakfast starter.

Use a pancake mix or the recipe below to make the batter. It goes together quickly, so start the griddle warming slowly in the meantime. Add fresh corn cut from the cob for that unbeatable flavor, or canned or frozen corn kernels if more convenient. Bake the Corn Pancakes on a lightly greased hot griddle and serve with a brown sugar sirup. Glazed apricot or peach halves make an attractive accompaniment.

Since corn cakes cost only about 2 1/2 cents apiece, you can flip them happily for your family until they say "enough!"

FRESH CORN CAKES

1 cup sifted enriched flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 egg

1 1/4 cups milk
1 cup corn, cut from cob
2 tablespoons melted shortening

Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Beat egg. Add milk, corn and shortening. Add to flour mixture and mix well. Cook on lightly greased hot griddle. Makes about 12 5-inch pancakes.

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
