

Staff Cuts Planned In OPS Northwest Regional Offices

Portland — (U.P.) — Drastic cuts in the staffs of the Office of Price Stabilization in the Pacific Northwest region were announced here Thursday by Carl C. Donough, Oregon district director.

The staff reductions will be effective September 1.

Donough said separation notices will be delivered to employees whose jobs will be discontinued by August 1.

Donough called the reduction a "tentative staffing pattern," since it has been appealed to Washington.

Offices concerned are Seattle, Portland, Boise, and Spokane. In the Portland office, 57 will be left of a former 114-person allowance.

Remaining will be the district director, nine persons in enforcement work, 20 in the price branch, two attorneys, two in management, and two in the information branch.

Donough said the present plans call for only two or three persons in the Spokane office. OPS spent \$69,000,000 last year, he said. This year only \$37,000,000 was appropriated by Congress for the ten-month period from July 1, 1952, to April 30, 1953.

Partner Joins Feed Store in Medford

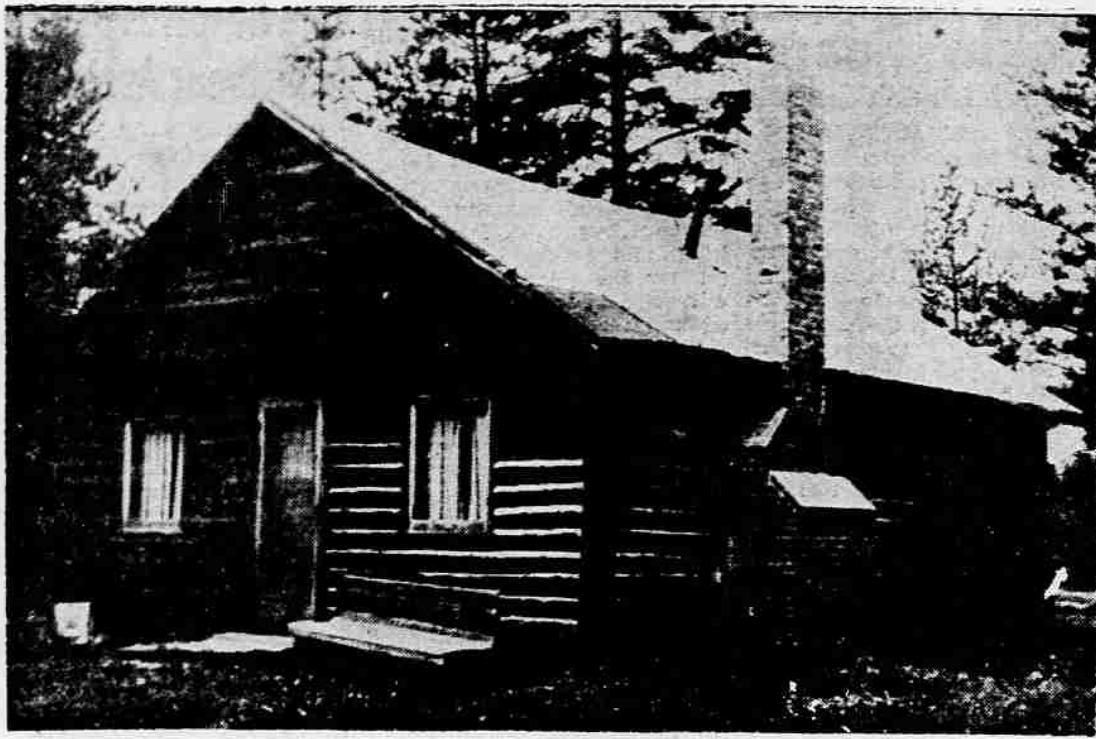
A new partner of F. E. Samson of the Samson Feed company is M. E. Sylvester, formerly of Portland, it was announced today.

Parents Refuse Custody of Their Two-Day-Old Infant

Chicago — (U.P.) — A quarrelsome husband and wife both insisted Wednesday neither wanted their tiny, newborn baby.

Mrs. Frank Stegert rested in her hospital bed and stuck by her statement that the two-day-old boy should be placed in his father's custody. She said she didn't want him.

Her husband's lawyer said that Stegert had not changed his mind and was still determined to give up the child.

Superior Court Judge George M. Fisher, who must decide the strange case, was baffled by the demands of the parents. He said he had never before sat in judgment of such a case.

Fisher postponed the case till next Tuesday in the hope that the father would change his mind and accept the baby.

Separate Maintenance — Last month Mrs. Stegert, 26, was then pregnant, filed a suit for separate maintenance in Fisher's court.

She said she did not want her

baby because she had no place to keep him.

"What's more I want him to have the baby so he can be reminded of me," she said.

She also said she wanted nothing that would remind her of her husband, not even his child.

Medford People Attend Meeting

A number of Medford people are attending the annual 10-day camp meeting of the Oregon Seventh-day Adventists, which opens today at Gladstone park, 10 miles south of Portland.

Among them are Floyd Yost, who is a delegate to a lay workers' conference the first three days; Pastor O. E. Schnepfer and his assistants, Melvin Thomkins and Lyle Cornforth, who have been helping to erect the camp for the past 10 days, and G. E. Fjarli, F. V. Cook, William Riemer, June Hoefft, G. J. Lang, C. A. Jones, Frank Archer, Earl Young and Helen Barrow.

The meeting is on a 70-acre tract purchased by the church in 1932, and some 7,000 persons will attend, with 4,000 more expected on week-ends, with additional one-day commuters bringing total week-end attendance to an estimated 15,000.

Festival Director Tells Kiwanians Of Artist's Role

The artist is a valuable member of society and the purpose of the arts is to show the relationship of man to God, the universe and man, Angus Bowmer, producing director of the Oregon Shakespearean festival, declared in a talk to Kiwanians on Wednesday at Rogue Valley Country club.

Bowmer, pointing out the aesthetic and material values of the festival, held annually at Ashland, outlined to Kiwanians why they should be interested in the festival and Shakespeare.

The speaker said that Shakespeare, next to the King James version of the Bible, has had the greatest influence on American culture. Drama, Bowmer explained, shows man in action. People can see the causes and results of action and see what makes man do the things he does.

However, Bowmer brought out that the enjoyment gained from the productions is reason enough for the festival.

The festival, owned by residents of the valley, has shown financial advancement each year and a large increase this year is foreseen, Bowmer reported. He said that last year 51 per cent of the audience was from outside the valley and that hotel and motel owners estimated that visitors spent \$255,000 here.

Ticket sale percentages this year are running 75 per cent from outside the valley and according to Bowmer, he said that money from admissions to the festival goes into expansion of the project.

BLM Expanding Operations

To Halt Beetle Infestation

Portland — (U.P.) — The Bureau of Land Management is expanding its division of forestry in a campaign against the Douglas fir bark beetle and in an effort to salvage 1,000,000,000 board feet of wind-thrown, fire and insect-killed timber.

Northwest Regional Administrator Roscoe E. Bell said Thursday seven days of intensive field training and orientation for a group of new foresters has just been completed.

The training session was held at Swishome and on logging operations in the area.

Bell said the 1,000,000,000 board feet of dead and dying timber on BLM lands must come out as fast as possible.

The beetle infestation has been estimated as covering 1,500,000 acres of private timber, 1,000,000 acres of national forest and 600,000 acres of BLM timber.

The Secretary of the Interior recently approved authority for the bureau to grant emergency short-term rights-of-way permits across lands administered by

the bureau for removal of private salvage timber.

Salem Man Dies After

Oklahoma Auto Crash

Stillwater, Okla. — (U.P.) — Arthur Benton Cooksey, 56, of Salem, Ore., died at a Stillwell hospital Wednesday from injuries suffered when the automobile in which he was riding plowed into a herd of cattle on U. S. Highway 59 near here, overturned and burned.

Cooksey and the driver of the car, John (Bud) Eads, 43, a Stillwell school teacher, and Keith Foreman, 63, of Stillwell, were pulled from the burning automobile by a passerby.

Cooksey suffered fatal internal injuries, Oklahoma highway patrolman C. E. Trigg said. Eads' neck was broken.
