Lefty Bob Collins is rough to beat when he's in form. He was in form Thursday night as he pitched the Salem Senators to a 6-0 verdict over Wenatchee's cellar-dwelling Chiefs.

Collins allowed only two scattered singles as his mates pounded out 11 bingles to make his job easy. Walt Pockay blasted hopes of a no-hitter with a one-baser in the second, and Bud Hjelma drilled another single in the ninth. Collins struck out eight and walked four.

Yanks Fagged After Series But Advantage Improved

The physically fagged-out Yankees and Indians, both fearing a letdown, got out of each other's clutches Friday after five hot and bitter games in three days in which the Yankees improved their first place advantage to 4½ games.

After their third double-header since Sunday, the Yankees were forced to go with a rookie, Tom Gorman, as their pitcher for Friday's game with the White Sox. The Indians, who moved on to Boston after losing three of the five games here, had to nominate a hurler, Sam Jones, whom they already had announced they were sending back to Indianapolis for further seasoning.

The Yankees wound up on top in the battling Thursday night by taking the odd game of the series, 5 to 4, when Joe Collins hit a ninth inning homer off relief pitcher Bob Lemon, who had started a game the day before. The Indians took the opener of the double header, 11 to 6, as Steve Gromek, top pitcher in the majors against the world champs beat them for the third time this season.

Shantz Wins 16th
The Red Sox topped the White Sox, 2 to 1, Washington edged Detroit, 1 to 0, and the Browns beat the Athletics, 9 to 5, after which Bobby Shantz won his 16th game, a 3 to 1 six-hitter. In the National league the Dodgers went six full games ahead of the Giants by defeating the Reds 2 to 1 in 11 innings while the Cardinals topped New York 3 to 2. The Braves edged the Cubs 1 to 0, and the Pirates won two from the Phillies, 2 to 1 and 4 to 2.

A homer by rookie Sammy White and a run-scoring double by George Kell gave pitcher Dizzy Trout the margin for a victory over the White Sox in which loser Marv Grissom gave up only three hits.

Jim Busby singled in the only run of the game in the ninth inning to give Frank Shea his sixth straight victory and his ninth of the year for the Senators a five-hitter that put them in fourth place ahead of Chicago. Loser Hal Newhouser also yielded only five hits.

East German Game Participation Blocked by Olympic Committee

Helsinki — (U.P.) — East Germany's participation in the 1952 Olympic games was blocked by the International Olympic Committee Friday.

The IOC spurned pleas of host Finland to open the doors to all, and decided it would not consider East Germany's eligibility until July 28. This threw out the Russian-occupied zone athletes because the games begin Thursday and will be nine days spent when the IOC next meets.

An informed source told the United Press that the IOC first voted for limited participation for East Germany. Then it decided to postpone the decision. The Finns asked for an immediate invitation but were turned down.

Third Stand
The decision came suddenly—and was the third stand taken by the committee on the question Friday.

The decision was a victory for Avery Brundage, newly elected IOC president and U. S. member of the committee.

"They have a right to compete in international sports competitions so long as they are desirable," he added. "We want the world's best amateur athletes to compete in the Olympic games."

But he said East Germany would not be admitted "because

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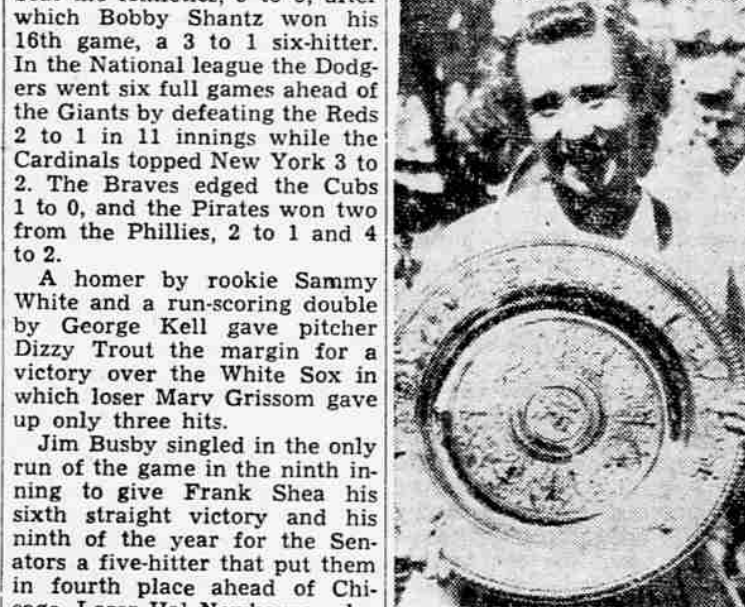

Helsinki — (U.P.) — Despite the return of Japan and Germany and the debut of Russia, a survey of all U. S. teams preparing for competition in the 15th Olympiad disclosed Friday that American athletes are favored to win 38 first place medals — exactly the same number as in 1948.
