The Bebbis also entertained guests from Los Angeles this week. They were Mr. and Mrs. Harold J. Cox and family.

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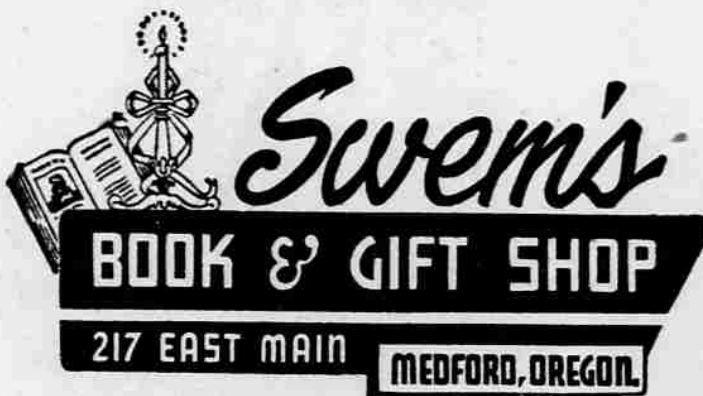
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
