Festival Footnotes

As dress rehearsal time nears, the festival theater has become a scene of noise and confusion. Workmen are busy completing the new benches and lighting the in the audience, placing director Bill Patton and his assistants are hanging lights and connecting seemingly endless wires, and the women of Ashland are aiding costume director Doug Russell by helping to complete the nearly 200 costumes which will be used this year.

Amid all this, rehearsals are being held from 10 in the morning until late at night; dancing, fencing and chorus rehearsals as well as the play rehearsals. As the rehearsal pace increases, so does the audience, for the public is admitted free until dress rehearsal time, when only holders of season tickets and their out-of-town guests are allowed in the shell. Many young children are among the rehearsal audiences, and some are so intent on catching every word spoken on stage that they must be shooed off the stage railing before the rehearsal can go forward.

Among the creations of Paul Reinhardt, Oklahoma scholarship student who has designed and executed costumes for "The Tempest," are three wigs of rayon "horsehair" which will be worn by goddesses Iris, Ceres and Juno. Clara Daniels, normally a brunette, will have a white, beaded and bejeweled wig for her part as Juno; Suzanne Hanson, who also has dark hair, will be blond for her role as Ceres; and Marjorie Lovberg will wear a wig of sky blue for Iris, goddess of the rainbow.

A trip to Crater Lake has been planned July 27 for those in the east who wish to see the famed lake and surrounding

territory, with a picnic at Union Creek on the return trip. It will give those who go a much-needed chance to relax from the strains of run-throughs, dress rehearsals and picture-taking sessions which often last into the early morning hours.

One of the more versatile members of the cast this year is Marjorie Lovberg, a 19-year-old sophomore at Montana State university. Marje was born in Minneapolis, Minn., but has lived in Missoula for several years. Her activities in the festival include the parts of Hero in "Much Ado About Nothing," Mistress Quickly in "Henry V," Iris in "The Tempest" and Calphurnia in "Julius Caesar." She also sings in the madrigal group and is a member of the country dance group.

She first became interested in acting when she was a sophomore at Missoula county high school, where she was cast in a play under the direction of Miss Mary V. Harris. Her parts in college productions included Lady Macbeth and Countess Gabrielle in "Mad Woman of Chaillet." The director at the university aroused her interest in the festival, and she came to Ashland by bus for the try-outs.

Marje is fond of dancing and hopes to study it in the future. She has studied voice and piano, and is a minor in music at the university. She is a member of Delta Gamma social sorority. Last summer she was an apprentice in summer stock at the Tenthhouse in Highland Park, Illinois.

Marje, who is of Norwegian descent, is the daughter of a Missoula carpenter and has one brother. She is the first member of her family who has shown an interest in showbusiness as a career, and prefers legitimate theater to a career in Hollywood. —R.S.

Community Club Elects Officers; Pioneers Give Talks

Wagner Creek — Wagner Creek Community club elected officers at the last meeting, held at the school house.

Byron Blevins was chosen president of the club and other officers are Mrs. A. C. Reusser, vice president; Mrs. Byron Bushnell, secretary; Mrs. Ralph Reed, treasurer; and Albert Gandt, trustee.

A potluck supper and program preceded the election. Mr. Blevins, master of ceremonies, introduced some pioneer members of the community who gave their memories of the past. Mrs. Roscoe Talbot was first with her talk on "School Days Memories of Wagner Creek."

Charles Loos, 77 years old, gave a recital on homesteading on the creek, and stressed the fact that faith in God and prayer were the strongholds of the pioneers of our country. Mr. Loos and his wife, also present, raised nine children on the family homestead, and one, Mrs. Byron Bushnell, still resides here.

Nellie Smith sang a ballad, "Aunt Nellie," as this 74-year-old woman is called by her neighbors, has lived at her present home since she and her deceased husband homesteaded it 55 years ago.

Mrs. Herman Sommer and Miss Goldie Abbot gave readings. Both were born and raised in the community.

Mr. and Mrs. Grant Torrey were unable to be present, but sent an account of the first permanent school on the creek in 1888, of which they were among the first pupils. The building was of logs, and the desks were made by the parents of the students. It was located on what is now the Ed Hill ranch.

Mr. and Mrs. Ormy Goddard also sent an account of their schooling in the early 1900's in the first building at the present site. This building was built in 1930.

Mrs. Ralph Reed, former school board clerk, brought the memories up to date with an account of the past few years and the events which led up to the consolidation of Wagner Creek school with the one in the Phoenix district.

An original poem by Mrs. Talbot was read by Mr. Blevins, and the program closed with the group singing "School Days."

Among the little-known casualties of World War II were the race course and cricket fields at Gibraltar. The British eliminated them to make way for a modern airfield.

Famous Pianist Turns to Moderns For New Repertoire

New York —(U.P.)—Claudio Arrau, who is reputed to have the most extensive repertoire among the world's major pianists, has set himself the task of mastering a vast new field of modern music.

The Chilean pianist feels that contemporary composers need and deserve a boost.

"That is why I am going to play as much modern music as I can in the next ten years," he said in an interview.

Arrau's interest in modern music may come somewhat as a surprise to his admirers. For the last decade he has concentrated almost exclusively on the classic compositions, giving rise to the impression that he spurned modern music.

"That is not the case," he said. "As a matter of fact I believe firmly in the music of the future. I feel an urge and a duty to dedicate more of my time to it."

To Take Time Off

For the first time since 1941, Arrau plans to take three months off next summer to make a start toward his new goal. He said composers that interest him particularly are Charles Ives, Aaron Copland, Roger Sessions and Walter Piston of the United States, Olivier Messiaen and Pierre Boulez of France, Benjamin Britten and Lenox Berkeley of Britain, Juan Jose Castro and Juan Carlos Paz, of Argentina, Domingo Santacruz of Chile, and Camargo Guarnieri and Heitor Villalobos of Brazil.

Arrau said his ambition is not new.

"I have always wanted to play modern music but I have never had the time," he added.

Arrau covers an average of 60,000 miles every year, a high record made possible by his repertoire of 76 recital programs and 63 orchestral works.

Arrau, who was 49 in February and looks around 35, has another ambition.

"My great grandmother lived to 120 and my mother is now an active 92," he said. "There is no reason why I should not live to 110. I plan to give my fare-

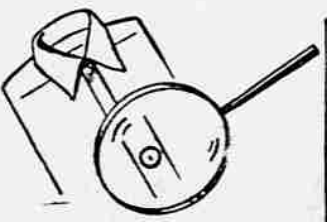
