Studs Subdue Cubans 5 to 3 in Exhibition

The Medford Cheney Studs played one of their defensive games for eight innings then survived a wobbly ninth canto Friday night to defeat the peppy barnstorming Havana Cuban baseball contingent 5 to 3 at the fairgrounds here.

Medford, with only one harmless error charged up went into the final frame with a 3 to 1 advantage. But before the Studs could retire the side and claim victory, the Cubans picked up two additional runs on three misplays and three hits, one of them a double by Francisco Herrera.

Three consecutive hits by Snuffy Smith, Terry Maddox and George Sanders in the second inning brought the Studs a run and gave them a lead they never relinquished. In the third stanza the Cheney crew got a couple of markers for a 3 to 0 margin. The bases were filled on hits by Jack Gordon and Don Fawcett, a fielder's choice by Frank Roelandt and a walk to Smith. Maddox drove in two runners with a single.

Gordon Doubles
Roelandt singled and Gordon two-baggered in the fifth inning for another counter. The Cubans got a single run in the seventh on a walk to Aldo Salvent and double by Isidro Beltran. Medford's fifth score was in the same inning when Moose Blevins doubled and Roelandt singled.

Roelandt was the heavy hitter for the Studs with a double and two singles in four trips to the plate. He got on base every time at bat, once on a fielder's choice and was driven home by teammates for two of the runs. Maddox and Gordon each hit two for four, Gordon rapping a two-baser, and each drove in two runs.

Smith and Maddox came up with fine catches in the outfield. Smith made a stumbling snag of a fly ball after a long run. Gordon made a sensational back-

Haverford, Pa. — (U.P.) — Maureen (Little Mo) Connolly, already owner of the U. S. Wimbledon and Irish tennis titles, added another Saturday, when she defeated Mrs. Bunny Harshaw Vosters of Philadelphia, 6-2, 6-0, to win the Pennsylvania and Eastern States championship for the third straight year.

The 17-year-old wizard from San Diego, Calif., required only 28 minutes to trip Mrs. Vosters. Philadelphia and Middle States champion, and wrap up another crown in her first start since her international victories abroad early this month.

So potent was Miss Connolly's overhand and flawless her backhand, she built up a 4-0 lead in her first set before her blonde opponent could register her first game-triumph at Merion Cricket club.

Nurmi Trots With Torch On Last Leg

Helsinki — (U.P.) — Paavo Nurmi, a ghost from the sport's glorious past, carried the Olympic torch on its last leg of the relay from Greece Saturday as the 1952 games began with pomp and pageantry.

From 1920 to 1928 the famed "Flying Finn" won nine Olympic medals. Now he is balding and 55, the owner of a little Helsinki haberdashery. But he relived his hours of glory and he trotted into the stadium with the torch to the mighty cheers of 70,000 spectators.

A steady rain pelted Olympic stadium as the colorful ceremony was unveiled in the tradition of ancient Greece. A total of 5,297 athletes from 69 nations paraded their colors.

Salute Barks
After the parade there was a pause — and then the staccato bark of a 21-gun salute that heralded the approach of the Olympic torch, brought by relays after being lighted from a fire on Mount Olympus in Greece.

The host nation always picks the runner to carry the torch the last lap — and his name remains a deep secret until the moment of the ceremony.

Saturday — as it was announced the great Nurmi would bear the torch — a mighty cheer burst from the crowd. Nurmi raced in, holding aloft the lighted torch.

Break Ranks
The athletes who had paraded into the stadium broke ranks to line the running track. Their team leaders urged them to get back in formation. But they would not budge from their vantage points. Instead, they stood and cheered as Nurmi circled the stadium.

His stride still has its picture-perfect fascination.

Nurmi carried the torch to the bowl underneath the Olympic flag and lighted the Olympic flame which will burn for the two weeks' duration of the games. Another cheer broke from the crowd. It was a tingling spectacle.

Nurmi then passed the torch to another great Finnish runner of yore, Hannes Kolehmainen. He carried it upstairs to the top of a 225-foot tower where another flame was blazed.

The commission said, however, that because of the late date and the August season for antelope hunting, applications for antelope were being prepared now.

Antelope Applications
Antelope hunting applications for the proposed August season allowing 1200 antelope tags for three areas in southeastern Oregon will be made available at all game commission license agencies this week.

Applications for all special hunts will be accepted only on forms provided by the game commission, and the hunter's signature and license must accompany the application.

No special hunt applications will be accepted from hunters who held a special season tag in the 1951 hunts.
