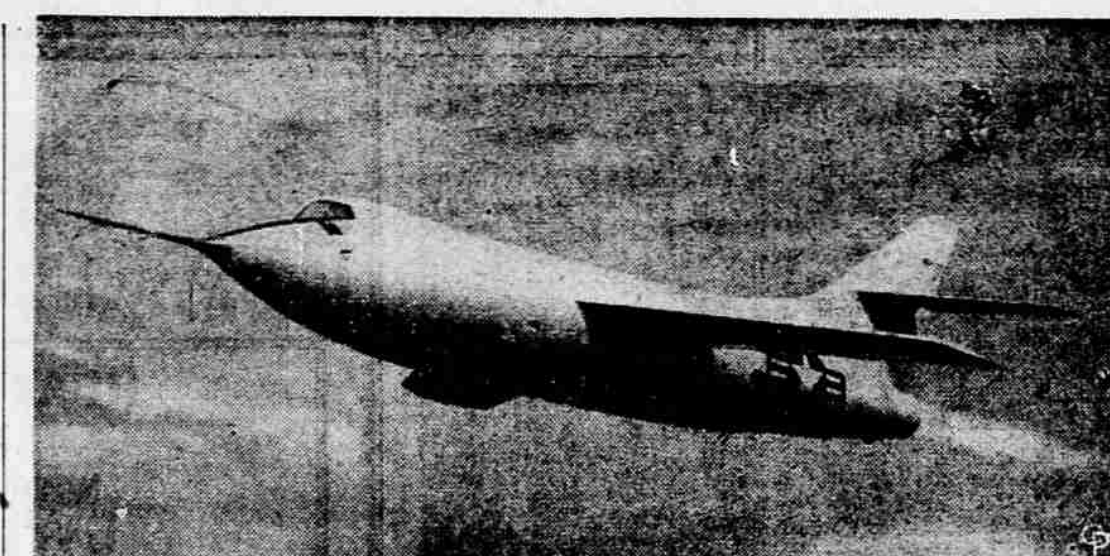

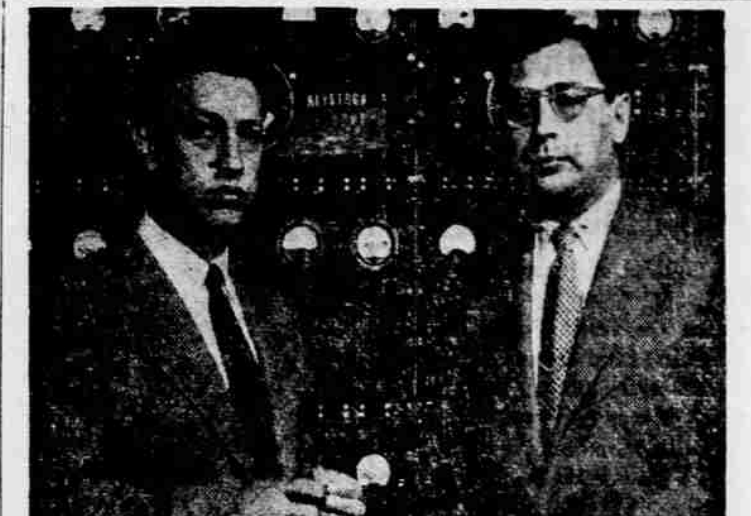
Defense Housing Okayed For Coos Bay-Coquille

Washington (U.P.)—The govern-
ment has authorized private con-
struction of defense housing
units in the Coos Bay-Coquille,
Ore., critical defense housing
area.

The Housing and Home Fi-
nance Agency said 120 units will
be built in the area, making a
total of 85,931 privately built
units programmed under the De-
fense Housing Act.

Contractors who build the
units in accordance with govern-
ment requirements will re-
ceive special financing aid from
the Federal Housing Adminis-
tration, including a suspension
of credit controls.
