Dr. Al Griffin, queen contest chairman, would make no statement as to any magic in the connection between the contest and wedding bells but only looked sad and issued a call for more candidates from 14 to 21 years of age.

He pointed out that candidates may enter without sponsors and that there were weekly prizes to be gained, and that every candidate would receive a prize at the end of the contest.

Miss Anne Weaver won the weekly queen's contest ending July 18 with 22,500 votes. Miss Donna Schrader was second with 15,000 and Miss Kay Carrara was third with 12,500.

First prize was a table lamp from Weeks and Orr Furniture store; second, a view - master from Ander's Photo shop; and third, a slip gift certificate from Jean Hart's.

Weekly contests include only that week's vote, while the final contest will be the cumulative totals for the entire period. Each ticket sold counts 100 votes.

Rogue River Bond Election Passes

Rogue River — A \$4,200 bond election to install night lights at the high school field here was passed for the second time by only a nine-vote majority Friday, according to Mrs. Cloyd Dick, clerk of school district No. 35. The vote was 109 for and 100 against.

Work on the lights will be started immediately by Trowbridge and Flynn Electric company, the only bidder. The school system is digging post holes while the rest of the work is to be done by the contractors.

It is hoped that the lights can be up for the remainder of the summer baseball season, the clerk reported.

An earlier election was declared invalid by the county clerk's office because of a discrepancy in posting election notices.

"After they absorbed the cosmic rays, we got them ready for shipment back to NYU where it is hoped some valuable information in atomic research will be obtained," he said.

Others making the climb were Robert J. Goodwin, 25, Salt Lake City, Utah; Ernest Baumann, 28, Leadville, Colo., and Robert L. Anderson, 23, Milwaukie, Ore.

Hackett is the only American who has conquered the highest peaks in both North and South America and Africa.

State Men Report Crop Outlook Good Throughout Oregon

Salem — (U.P.) — Crops throughout Oregon appear in excellent shape and barring unforeseen conditions, good harvests will prevail, E. L. Peterson, director of the State Department of Agriculture, said Saturday after returning from a week's conference in Medford, Klamath Falls, Ontario and Redmond.

Labor is scarce and expensive and a tight labor situation is expected as the harvest season develops, Peterson said. He was accompanied by Frank McKennon, chief of the departments division of plant industry, and W. L. Close, supervisor of the Federal-State Shipping Point Inspection Service.

Discussed Potato Inspection
In sessions with the Oregon Potato Council at Klamath Falls, the officials discussed problems of potato inspection and reviewed the revised shipping point fee schedule. Here, as well as at Ontario and Redmond, they also asked potato growers and the trade to review the Oregon potato law in the light of any needed changes to bring it in line with present - day conditions.

The officials said shipments of the early potato crop in the Ontario districts are heavy, now hitting more than 100 cars a day. Quality is excellent, yields good and prices satisfactory.
