

Last Codling Moth Spray Advised

The last cover spray for codling moth control on pears should be completed three weeks before the fruit is picked, according to L. G. Gentner, experiment station entomologist, and C. B. Cordy, county agent in horticulture.

This will place Bartlett spraying completion on July 21 for blocks to be picked early, but can be delayed until August 1 where picking is late, they pointed out. Winter pears can be sprayed with the Bartlett following them with the application consisting of 1 1/2 pounds of 50 per cent DDT per 100 gallons, or seven pounds an acre in speed sprayers, with one-quarter pint spreader deposit added for each 100 gallons.

Fear psylla, which is now present in most orchards, will "increase rapidly," Cordy and Gentner pointed out, with control for psylla and mites being one pint of 20 per cent or one-half pint of 40 per cent TEPP and three pounds of EPN, or four pounds of Parathion per acre.

Recommended dosage for apples is two pounds of DDT for each 100 gallons, or 10 pounds an acre with completion by August 5. For home orchard sprayers, use one-half pound in five gallons for each mature tree.

Annual Pear Pack School Will Open

The annual pear packing school, sponsored jointly by the State Department of Vocational Education, the Medford Public Schools, the Jackson County Fruit Growers League, and the Rogue Valley Traffic association, will start Monday, it was announced yesterday.

The school will be held at Pineapple Packing company's plant No. 2, off South Central avenue and at the end of South Front street.

The annual series of classes are held for the purpose of giving local residents an opportunity to learn correct methods of packing pears, so that they can be employed during the packing season. Mrs. Mabel Penland will be principal instructor, with several qualified assistants.

The classes are already filled, the announcement said. Those who have applied and who have received acceptance slips are to report at the time shown on the slips. Morning classes will be from 9 to 12 noon, and afternoon classes will be from 1 to 4. The school will end August 2.

Health Board Warns Against False Claims

Portland (U.P.)—The Oregon State Board of Health has warned that manufacturers of several septic tank cleaning compounds have made false claims about their products.

Curtiss M. Everts Jr., state sanitary engineer, said the companies have claimed their cleaners will keep solids from forming so that septic tanks will never have to be cleaned.

"There are no chemicals or digesting yeasts which are capable of reducing the solids in a septic tank to the point where cleaning is unnecessary," Everts said.

Gripsholm Passenger Tells Of Rescuing 45 Survivors Of Freighter Black Gull

(Editors note: Mrs. May Forsberg, the wife of Aake Forsberg, New York correspondent for The Dagens Nyheter of Stockholm, was returning to Sweden aboard the liner Gripsholm when the ship turned to rescue survivors of the burning freighter Black Gull. The following is her eyewitness account of the rescue radio-telegraphed to her husband.)

Aboard the Gripsholm (U.P.)—Most of the Gripsholm's passengers had gone to bed when the SOS was received from the Norwegian freighter Black Gull. Even when we reached the scene of the tragedy two hours later, many slept on.

They missed one of the most dramatic sights I have ever seen—the blazing ship, the Gripsholm's motor launches setting out for the search, the flares from the United States Coast Guard planes. If it hadn't been for those flares, a great many of the survivors might never have been rescued from the dark waters.

Rescued "Sorry Sights"

The 45 rescued passengers and crew members were sorry sights when they were brought back to the Gripsholm. Some were smoke blackened and burned, others were soaked from long hours in the water.

Workers had food and plenty of hot coffee ready for them in no time, and warm, dry clothes were distributed to them from the ship's stores. Dr. O. Witlander treated the 10 burned men.

Nils Varem, the Black Gull's third officer, was the most seriously burned. His face and hands were seared and he was kept aboard the Gripsholm when the other survivors were transferred to the Coast Guard Cutter Mackinac. He will return to Norway after we land in Sweden unless he needs to be hospitalized.

Reunion Touching

One of the most touching scenes was the reunion of one of the crew members with his wife and small child who had

been passengers aboard the Black Gull. He had been separated from them in the rescue boats and had supposed that they were lost. His wife thought he was lost.

When this family was reunited, they fell into each other's arms with tears of joy, unable to speak. Everyone who watched them was very moved.

Another crew member had even a closer shave. He swam without a life preserver of any sort for two and a half hours before he could get the attention of the rescuers. Finally, when he had about given up hope, the steward of the Black Gull saw him from the Gripsholm's launch and he was taken aboard.

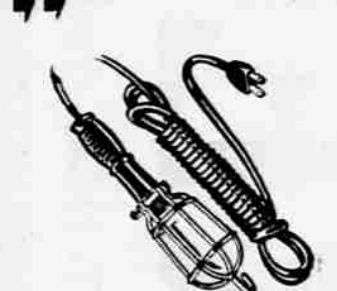
