400 Years Old Remains of Saint To Be Displayed

Bombay—(U.P.)—The body of St. Francis Xavier, who died in China almost 400 years ago, is in an extraordinary state of preservation.

It will be exposed for public veneration next December at the Church of Bon Jesus, near Panjim, capital of Goa, Portuguese India.

More than a million pilgrims from all over the globe are expected to make the trip to the shrine of the saint who landed in India, May 6, 1542. Members of royal families, a hundred bishops from Burma, Ceylon, China, India, Pakistan, and the Philippines, in addition to notable personages in all walks of life will be included in the pilgrimage.

The last exposition of the body was held in 1931.

Born in Spain
Francisco de Yasu y Xavier (St. Francis) was born at Xavier Castle, about 18 miles from the town of Pamplona, Spain, on April 7, 1506. He was the son of Juan de Yasu, a high official and prominent lawyer of the Kingdom of Navarre (now part of Spain). His mother was Marie Aznarez de Sada Xavier y Azpilcueta.

Because the Xaviers had joined the side of France against Spain in a fight for rule over Navarre, they faced disaster. Francis' father died in 1515 of a broken heart due to the destruction of his kingdom. Members of the family were branded as traitors and his grief-stricken mother could salvage very little from the calamity that came upon them.

Francis decided to choose learning as a career and he entered the University of Paris in 1525. He completed his philosophy course in 1530 and qualified for the title of "magister," equivalent to the degree of M. A. today.

With Loyola
At about that time he met an ex-soldier, Ignatius Loyola (St. Ignatius), whose philosophy changed the whole life of Francis.

"What does it profit a man to gain the whole world and lose his own soul," Ignatius had queried.
Francis was ordained in Venice, June 24, 1537. In March, 1540, he set out for Portugal. Previously, in 1533, he had formed an association with five others which was to become the Society of Jesus (Jesuits) six years later.

In 1541, on his 35th birthday, he sailed from Lisbon and after spending the winter in Mozambique, East Africa, arrived in Goa, May 6, 1542.

He was appointed papal legate for the Indies and devoted most of his time to the Christians of Goa. In the same year, he visited Cochín and Travancore (India).

St. Francis went to Ceylon, Madras (India) and Malaya in 1545. At the start of the next year he reached Amboina, one of the Moluccas Islands. He returned to Malaya in 1547.

Subsequently, he met a native of Japan who so fired his imagination that he began to make preparations for an eventual mission to that country.

With three Japanese and two Jesuit priests, St. Francis embarked on the long and dangerous voyage to Japan. The party landed at Kagoshima on August 15, 1549, and was warmly received.

Red Cross Swim Certificates Given Out This Morning

Red Cross swimming certificates for beginners, intermediates and swimmers were given out this morning at Hawthorne pool for the course just ended, according to the local Red Cross office.

The session began on June 23 and lasted until July 17, with a total registration of 116 beginners, 40 intermediates and 12 swimmers. Of this number 47 beginners passed, nine intermediates and nine swimmers.

Those passing the difficult swimmer's course were Jane Edgerton, 1905 Westerland drive; Carolyn Jackson, Route 2, box 424, Medford; Johnna Henson, 22 Willamette avenue; Tom Morris, 240 Sunrise avenue; Randall Stothers, 412 East Main street; David Espey, 619 Cook street; Pamela Cooksey, 2127 Jackson boulevard, and Dean and Alba Lamp, 115 Jeanette avenue.

Stiff Requirements
Requirements for the course were swimming 110 yards breast stroke; 100 yards side crawl, 100 yards back crawl, crawl or trudgen crawl, 50 yards back swim with the legs alone, turns, surface dive, treading water for one minute, plunge dive, running front dive, and 10-minute swim.

The certificates for all three classes were presented by Instructors Dick Camden and Phil Sanders.

The dates for the next swimming classes have not yet been set, but will be announced later, according to Red Cross officials.

Seoul, Korea—(U.P.)—United Nations forces recaptured fog-shrouded "Old Baldy" from stunned Chinese Communists Monday to climax four days of bloody see-saw battle.

Fourth in Series
