Third Annual Heyday Held In Barnum Gardens Sunday

Tudor guild's third annual Bard's Heyday is now history, the large benefit event having been successfully held Sunday evening in the garden of Mr. and Mrs. Berthold Barnum, South Pacific highway. About 400 attended.

Given each year as a forerunner of the annual Oregon Shakespearean festival, which opens August 1 in Ashland, the Heyday is held to raise funds for aiding actors and generally promoting the festival, and to provide those interested in the festival an opportunity to meet members of the company.

Following the pattern set by the first two Heydays, Sunday's event opened with supper followed by music, dancing and talks.

The program, arranged by Bill Ball, festival director from New Rochelle, N.Y., opened with two costume dances given by Miss Clara Margaret Daniels, Medford; Miss Eleanor Prosser, San Marino, Calif.; Paul Reinhart, Tulsa, Okla., and Douglas Meeker, Portland.

Music for the dancers was provided by Hal Wilson, Ashland, Miss Alice Grace, Medford, Mrs. Hans Lampl, Los Angeles; Bernard Windt, Phoenix, and Miss Lenore Brown, Ashland, with Mr. Lampl, director of music for the festival, directing.

Later Mr. Lampl spoke on Elizabethan music and instruments, saying that the people of Shakespeare's time were fond of music and that Queen Elizabeth promoted interest in music during her reign. He spoke of the instruments used in that period, and pointed out that music students and researchers are faced with many difficulties in endeavoring to re-create music and instruments used in those days.

He introduced a group of recorder players, saying that the recorder, popular in Queen Elizabeth's time, was typical of the musical instruments used in that period. In the group were Mr. and Mrs. Bernard Windt, Phoenix, Mrs. Lampl and Mr. and Mrs. Fred Shepherd, Phoenix, and they played two numbers under Mr. Lampl's direction.

A group of madrigal singers appeared in three numbers. Some of the singers are valley residents, and others are festival company members. Cake Named to Confer With Gen. Eisenhower

Denver, Colo.—(U.P.)—Ralph H. Cake, Portland, Republican national committeeman from Oregon, was named here Tuesday as one of three GOP leaders who will confer Wednesday with Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, the party's presidential candidate. Cake will drive with Gov. Robert H. Duff of Pennsylvania and Gov. Dan Thornton of Colorado to General Eisenhower's vacation spot near Fraser, Colo., in the Rocky mountains some 70 miles west of Denver. They will be the first political callers on the GOP presidential nominees since he left on his fishing expedition.
