Medford Irrigation Flume Breaks Monday

Water in the main canal supplying the Medford and Rogue Valley irrigation districts was halted temporarily Monday by a break in the Lake Creek flume, according to Jack Hoffbuhr, manager of the Medford district. The water was turned out at 5:30 a.m. Monday. Repairs were completed in about four hours and the water was turned in again.

The Lake Creek flume is supported by a wooden substructure where the break occurred. It is 30 years old and must soon be replaced, Hoffbuhr said. This is the third delay caused by the flume this season.

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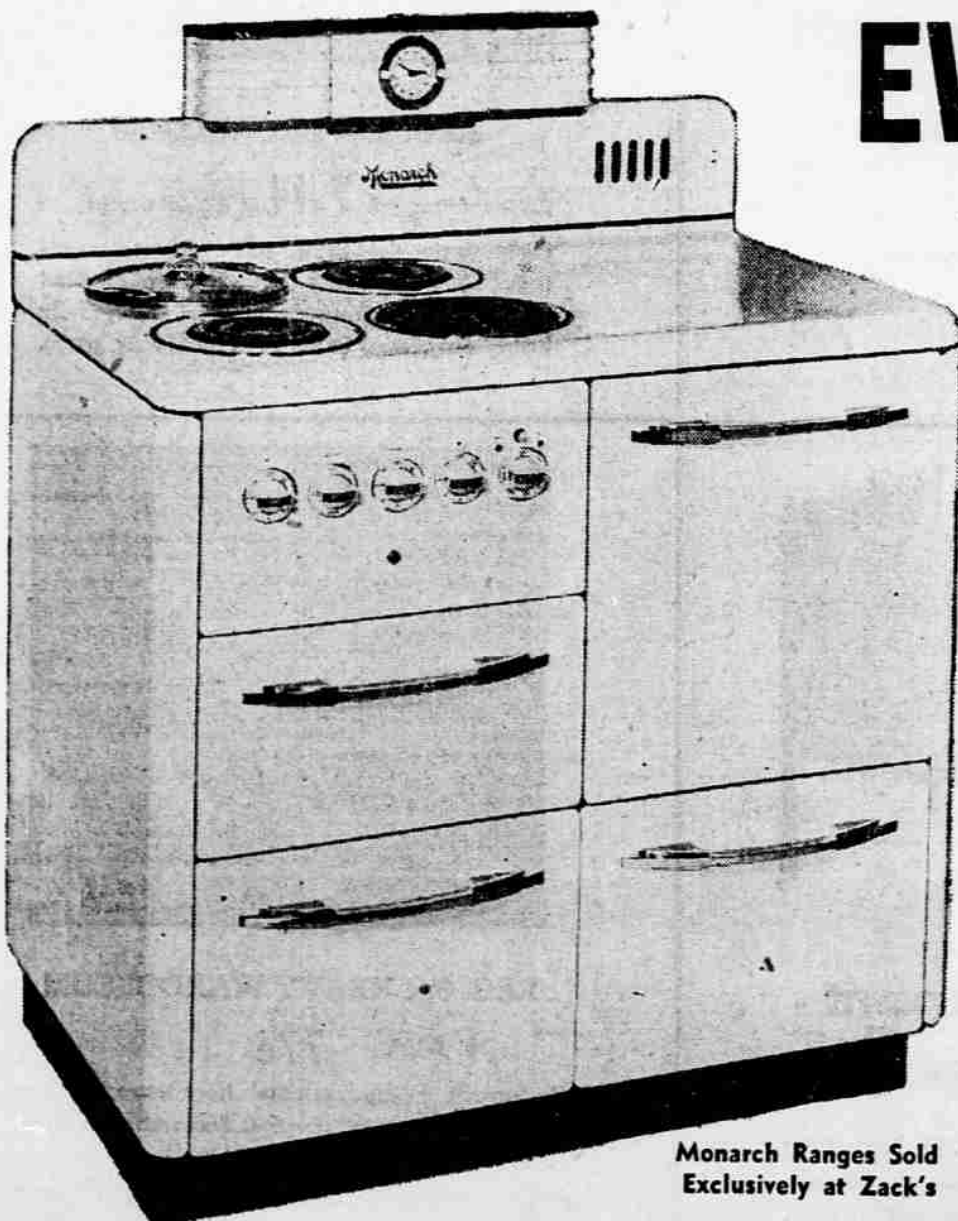
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
