Vancouver Plywood Plant Hit by Fire

Vancouver, Wash. — (U.P.) — Fire which was believed to have been caused by sparks from a welder's torch caused damage estimated at \$250,000 to \$300,000 to the Vancouver Plywood company mill here Tuesday afternoon.

The blaze, which broke out in the fuel room of the mill destroyed the frame barking shed, where logs are peeled, and heavily damaged the marking machinery.

Flames spread to the lathe shed and damaged some machinery there before firemen were able to contain the blaze.

Rich Uranium Ore Found by Portlander

Portland — (U.P.) — A Portland building contractor and part-time prospector may have found the location of extremely valuable uranium deposits, it was reported here Wednesday.

Samples of rich uranium-bearing ores which have aroused the interest of the raw materials division of the Atomic Energy Commission are in the possession of Martin E. Oakes, Portland.

Oakes, who mixes prospecting with deer hunting, is keeping a tight-lipped silence about where he found them.

The samples, said to be the most promising ever to go through the screening laboratories of the U.S. Bureau of Mines, at Albany, Ore., consist of three types of uranium-bearing rocks, according to a letter from A. H. Roberson, acting chief, technical services branch, of the bureau.

Youngster in Coma After Fall From Horse

Vancouver, Wash. — (U.P.) — Six-year-old Charles L. Duback has been in a coma at North Permanente hospital for a week as result of a fall from a horse, hospital attendants reported Wednesday.

The lad, son of Mr. and Mrs. Delbert Duback, Vancouver, was dragged 350 feet by the horse which bolted when the youngster fell. His foot became entangled in a stirrup.

Hiss Lawyers Study Denial of New Trial

New York — (U.P.) — Attorneys for Alger Hiss studied a court decision Wednesday which denies a new trial on perjury charges for the former high State Department official.

Federal Judge Henry Goddard rejected a defense motion Tuesday that Hiss, now serving a five-year prison term, was the victim of "forgery by type-writer."

The motion contended that a typewriter which played a key role in the perjury case was a "fake" constructed "by or on behalf of Whittaker Chambers, as part of his plot for the false incrimination of Alger Hiss."
