Miss Rhoda Williams Attends Buddhist Wedding Ceremony

Miss Rhoda Williams, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. T. V. Williams, 1975 Houston road, Medford, attended a Buddhist wedding in San Francisco last weekend.

The bride, Miss Tsyuyu Yuzuriha, who had roomed with Miss Williams at the University of Oregon for two years, and the bridegroom, Leslie Takagawa, are Japanese-Americans. Miss Williams said that although much of the wedding was in Japanese-Buddhist tradition, some American customs were used.

Upon entering the Buddhist church, Miss Williams said, one immediately noted the incense burning, and the paintings decorating the altar room. The priest was dressed in a long white pleated robe with a gold sash, but the bride wore the traditional American, white wedding gown. Most of the ceremony was in Japanese, but Miss Williams said the "I do's" and benediction were in English.

The rings were presented to the couple by the priest, who held them on a fan. Miss Williams said that the ceremony was "beautiful and solemn" and that throughout the wedding members of the wedding party gave formal bows.

The reception was held at a restaurant in China town, with about 100 attending the 13-course dinner. Miss Williams said that the guests applauded the newlyweds when they entered the restaurant, and a program of speeches and music had been planned. She believes that the talks were blessings to the couple, but is not sure, since they all spoke in Japanese. The father of the groom sang a traditional Japanese song, and each speaker and performer was applauded.

Miss Williams said that she attempted to eat with chopsticks, but finally resorted to silverware to finish her dinner.

Garden Notes

(Editor's note: This is one of a series of articles on gardening subjects, prepared for The Mail Tribune by the Jackson county agent for horticulture. They will be carried weekly during the gardening season.)

Hydrangeas are now in full bloom and the color of the bloom is causing concern to some gardeners. In some cases slips have been taken from plants which have blue flowers, and when these slips start blooming the flowers are pink.

The color of the hydrangea bloom is governed by the presence or absence of lime in the soil. Where the soils are high in lime the bloom will be pink. In acid soils the bloom will be blue. This color can be changed artificially to a certain extent. If blue flowers are desired, aluminum sulfate used at the rate of a pound to a square yard will help turn the trick. As most of our soils are high in lime, the aluminum sulfate treatment is not too effective and is not very long lasting.

Can Deepen Color

If the hydrangeas are normally of a light blue color, the color can be deepened by the use of aluminum sulfate. If the blossoms are pink, then instead of trying to turn them blue, better results would be obtained by adding a little lime and increasing the density of the pink color.

Hydrangeas will also respond well to a little commercial fertilizer and to plenty of water. They normally thrive in a well drained, moist soil and while we can't very easily change the drainage of the soil, we can maintain good soil moisture. A handful of ammonium sulfate or three to four handfuls of complete fertilizer applied around each plant before watering would keep the plants in a good state of vigor.

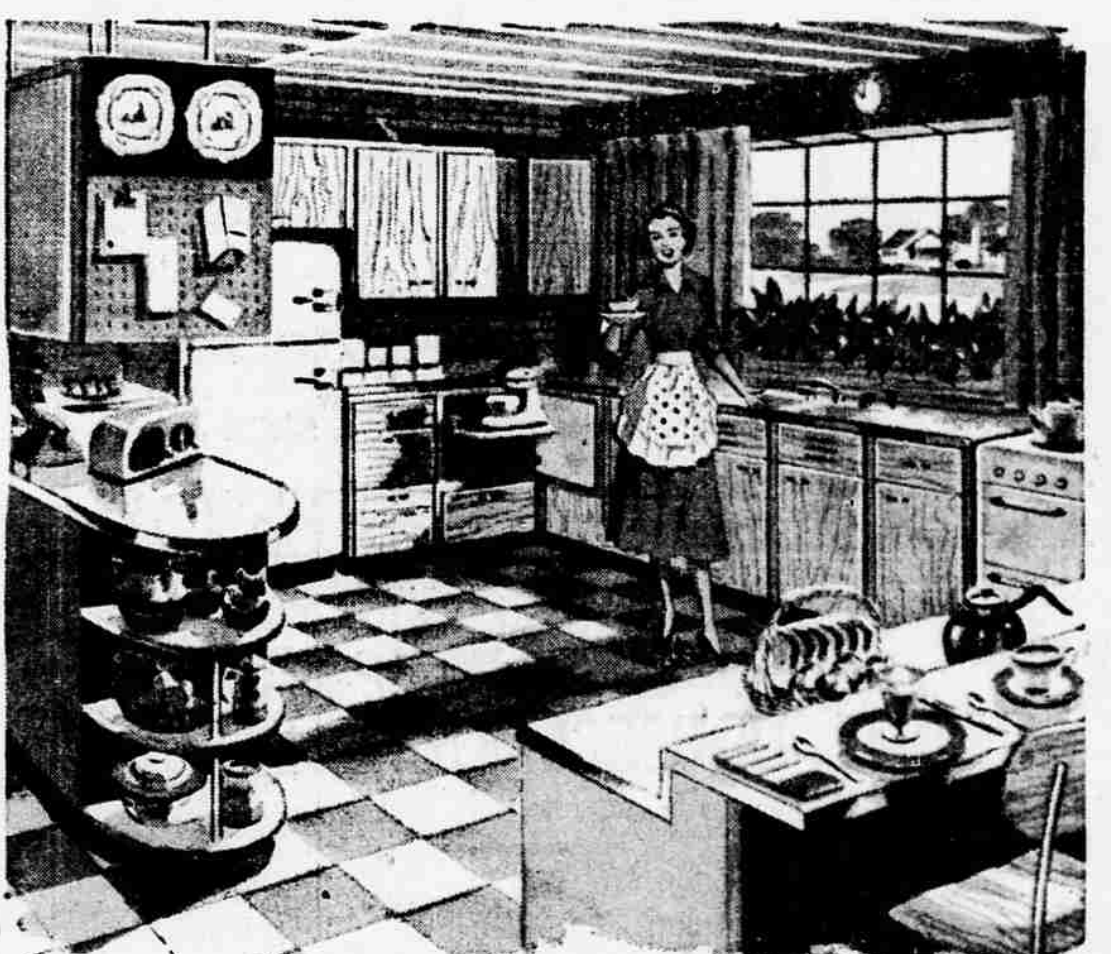
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
