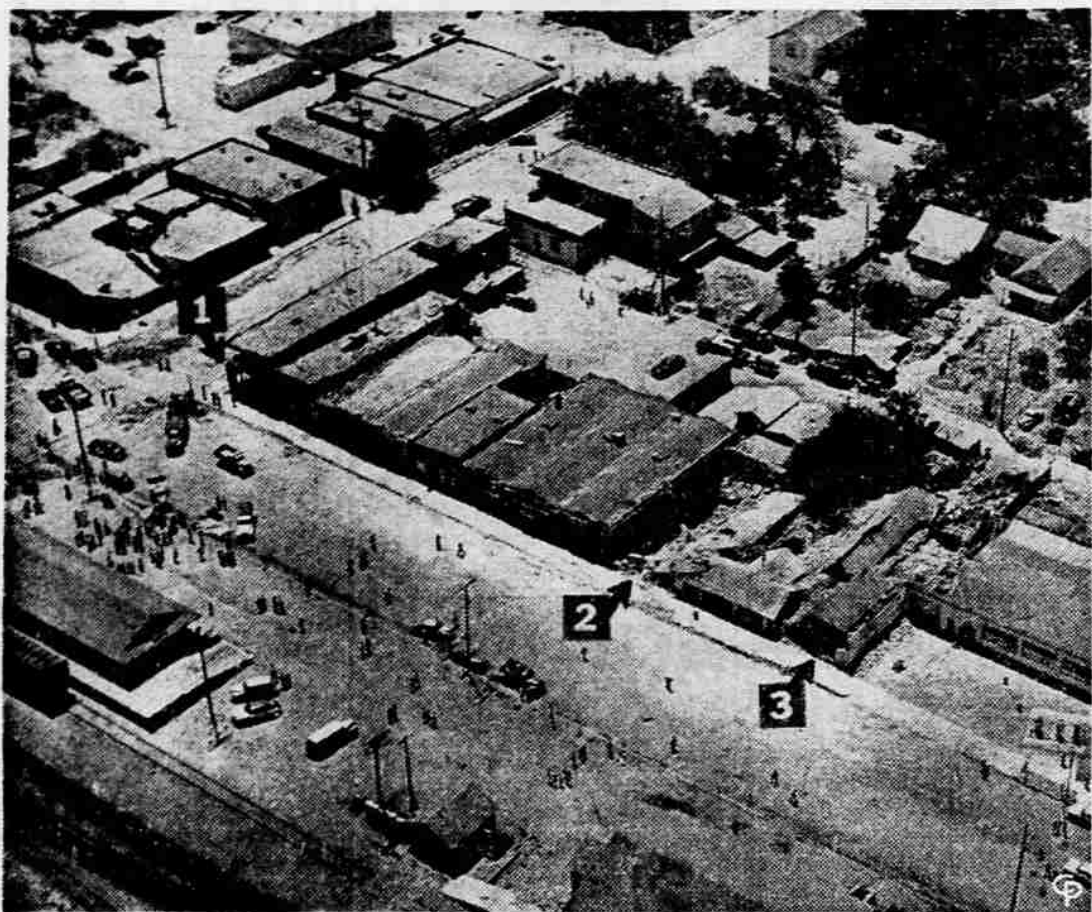

Quakes Crumbling More Buildings

Tehachapi, Calif. — (U.P.) — The earth still rumbled and trembled in Southern California, crumbling buildings already weakened by Monday's "killer quake," but scientists said Thursday the after shocks were tapering off.

Dr. Hugo Benioff, California Institute of Technology, said seismograph readings indicated that settling jolts from the quake that took 11 lives here and one in nearby Arvin, Calif., were following the "usual pattern."

Arvin, hit hard by the original quake, suffered some additional damage from after jolts Wednesday.

Shortage of Cans For Oregon Packers Seen This Summer

Washington — (U.P.) — Oregon canners and farmers will be without sufficient cans to pack their produce this summer unless there is renewed steel production, the National Production Authority has informed Sen. Wayne Morse.

The Oregon senator conferred with Hugh Kelleher, chief of the agency's can division, after Oregon canners and canning association representatives had asked him to investigate the situation.

No Encouragement

Morse said Kelleher's answers gave him no encouragement. Kelleher indicated that an individual canner could not expect more than 50 per cent of his normal supply of cans unless the steel strike is settled soon, Morse said.

The senator said the canning crisis was "the first indication of the strike's serious threat to the civilian economy." He said the situation would not have arisen had Congress accepted his proposals for production of vital steel through a steel industry seizure bill specifically outlining the rights of industry and labor.

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As We Live

GIRL PREJUDICED AGAINST MEN NEEDS PROFESSIONAL GUIDANCE

"When a young woman has a 'poisoned' attitude toward men, it's usually because of a childhood experience. That is the problem facing the worried parents who wrote:

(Q) "My husband and I are worried about our 23-year-old daughter. She is beautiful and could be popular with young men if she would allow herself to get to know them. In her friendships with young men, there seems to be a block. She has more than normal prejudice against the opposite sex, which keeps her from really loving any of them long enough to marry. We feel that she is ruining her life. How can we help her?"

(A) Your daughter's problem is too difficult and too serious for you or any layman to handle. She requires professional help and, as her parents, it is your duty to persuade her to get this help, no matter how much she may protest.

Discuss the problem with your doctor and ask him if he can help her. If not, ask him to turn over the case to a psychiatrist. He could probably do more with her than you or the doctor could.

I question your statement about "normal prejudice against the opposite sex." Children from 6 to 12 or 14 often have a prejudice of this sort, but, by the middle teens, it is generally a thing of the past. In its place comes a strong interest in and liking for the opposite sex. When prejudice against the opposite sex persists into late adolescence, or even into adulthood it is symptomatic of trouble which can keep a person from marriage and can even ruin their careers if their work requires that they come in contact with the opposite sex.

Distorted Information
Back of your daughter's prejudice, I suspect, is some very faulty and distorted information about sex and about men. Girls during childhood and ad-

olescence often pick up such information from their friends, from books they read, or from smutty stories. This leaves such a strong imprint on their minds that it takes a lot to counteract it and build up a healthy attitude based on correct information. For this, she will need professional help and guidance.

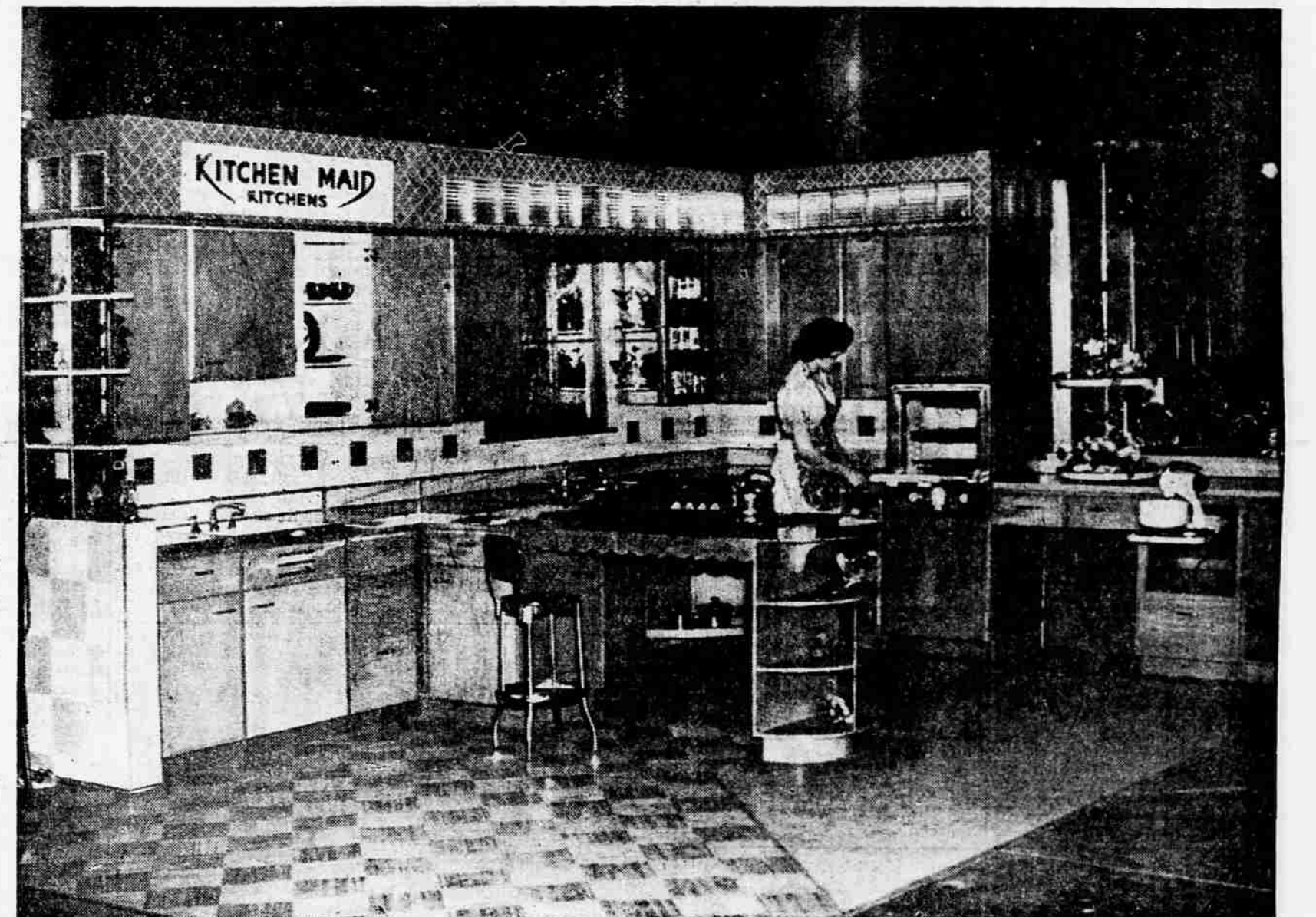
