Dakotans To Picnic At TouVelle Park

Former Dakota residents will attend the 17th annual Dakota picnic at TouVelle park which is set for 10 a.m., Sunday, July 27.

After a two-hour visiting period, those attending will have a picnic dinner with coffee, punch, and ice cream being served by a committee. Music by Alexander's string band and ukelele club will be a part of the program, and speaker of the day will be John A. Carter who will give a talk "Land of the Dakotans." Election of officers will then be held.

Boys and girls at the picnic will compete in foot, sack, wheelbarrow, and cracker eating races. The North Dakotans will take part in the relay race against the South Dakotans.

Other contests between the two states will include a rolling pin throw, horse shoe pitching, and a tug of war. Men will compete in the Big Dakota Wind game.

Prizes will be awarded to the oldest man and woman, the couples married for the longest and shortest periods of time, the youngest mother, the youngest child, persons who traveled farthest to get to the picnic, and the largest family.

The Dakota picnic first was held in July, 1935, and the association has made it a yearly affair since then with the exception of 1943 when no picnic was held.
