120,000 Veterans To Get Increases In Compensation

Nearly 120,000 blind, crippled and tubercular veterans of war and peacetime service will receive increased compensation payments in their checks due September 1, according to the Veterans Administration.

The increases, resulting from a law recently signed by the president, are automatic for all veterans who are receiving compensation checks, and are specified in the law. But veterans not now on the compensation rolls but who are covered by the new law must file applications with the VA.

Receiving the increased allotments will be veterans who have been awarded statutory allowances for the loss of hands or feet, for blindness, for total deafness and for arrested tuberculosis.

Range From \$5 to \$40
Monthly increases range from \$5, for veterans who have lost one hand, foot or eye, to \$40, for veterans who have lost both hands, both feet, been totally blinded or have received a combination of such disabilities.

The minimum monthly rate of compensation for service-incurred tuberculosis is increased from \$60 to \$67 and extended to cover World War II and Korean veterans. Previously these benefits have been available to World War I veterans only.

These new rates also are payable for peacetime service if the disabilities were incurred while engaged in extra-hazardous service. Rates of compensation for disabilities incurred during other peacetime service are 80 percent of wartime rates.

Newsman Allowed To Loiter Near Army Trial Site

Ft. Meade, Md. — (U.P.) — The Army Thursday dropped a corner of its security veil around the court martial of Maj. Gen. Robert W. Grow, but the proceedings were still shrouded in secrecy.

Gen. Edward H. Brooks, commander of the 2nd Army, announced that newsmen and photographers would be permitted to "loiter" outside the building where the 57-year-old former U.S. military attaché in Moscow is being tried on charges of letting his personal diary fall into Communist hands.

Secrecy Great At Start
The secrecy was so great as the trial opened Wednesday that the Army refused even to admit for a while that the court martial had started.

Grow is accused of improperly recording classified information in personal papers and failing to safeguard secret information. If convicted, he faces a maximum penalty of five years in prison and dismissal from the Army.

Army Man Finishes Parachute Classes

The school teaches how to pack and maintain parachutes, and before graduating the student must make a jump with a parachute he has packed himself, and also watches a jeep, supported by a parachute, dropped from an aircraft.

Ike, Tacticians Like Plan To Pull Demos Into Fold

Denver — (U.P.) — Dwight D. Eisenhower and his political tacticians Thursday put their faith in a new plan to pull disgruntled Democrats and independent voters into the Republican party fold.

The plan involves the continuation of the National Citizens Committee for Eisenhower, an organization that has functioned in recent months outside the regular Republican party but which was instrumental in getting the GOP presidential nomination for Eisenhower.

Ike Emphatic

Eisenhower talked over his campaign plans Wednesday with Sen. James H. Duff, R-Pa., Gov. Dan Thornton of Colorado, and Ralph H. Calkins, Republican national committeeman from Oregon.

Duff said Eisenhower was emphatic in his belief that the committee should be continued
