First Medford Census 967 In 1890; Growth of City Traced to Count in 1950

Medford was a village of 967 people when its population was first counted in the census of 1890, according to the Bureau of the Census.

According to a news release from Jack W. Traverse, Jr., district supervisor of the census at Sacramento, Calif., only four other cities in the state were reported in the 1890 census. They were Portland, with 46,385; Astoria with 6,184; Salem, with 3,398; and Klamath Falls, with 364.

Medford's percentage of growth was the greatest during the 10-year period from 1900 to 1910, Traverse said, when it grew from 1,791 to 8,840 — a jump of 393.6 per cent.

The 10-year period from 1940 to 1950 was the second-fastest time of growth for Medford, both in numbers and percentage. It increased by 6,025 persons to the 1950 total of 17,305.

Medford today is the fourth-largest city in the state, ranking behind Portland, Salem and Eugene, in that order.

These include data on the size of the labor force, migratory movements of the population, monthly volume of retail sales by geographic location and kind of business, and periodic production reports on industries critical to the nation's economy.

ICC Hearing on Line Transfer Ends Here

An Interstate Commerce commission hearing on the proposed transfer of an interstate trucking permit from Col. Athel H. Dudley, Phoenix, to Robert and Fred Wilcox and Fred DeWitt, all Medford, co-partners in the Green Streak Truck line, ended here yesterday.

The transfer of the permit, which must be approved by the ICC, was protested by West Coast Fast Freight, Pierce Freight lines, Consolidated Freightways, Los Angeles - Seattle Freight lines and Oregon-Nevada-California Fast Freight. The firms joined in the protest on the grounds that the partners could not carry out adequate service.

Join in Complaint
The trucking concerns also joined in filing a complaint charging that Dudley's franchise did not give authority for the purpose for which the prospective purchasers intended to use it. Their complaint also stated that Dudley, who has held the franchise for about 12 years, had abandoned certain rights covered by the franchise by not using them.

Attorneys for the co-partners pointed out that DeWitt has been hauling products which are exempt from ICC restrictions for the past 16 years and is experienced in trucking operations. They also called on witnesses to show that the Wilcox brothers are experienced in truck maintenance and in business operations.

The case presented by the freight lines stated that they can supply all necessary service to the area. It also stated that Dudley had hauled a limited number of commodities, while the prospective purchasers of the permit planned to haul all types.

Witnesses for the co-partners stated that, due to increases in population, business and trucking operations have also increased greatly in this area in recent years. Several local shippers also stated that they had used Dudley's truck line for 15 years and had not been able to get similar service elsewhere.

It was pointed out that Dudley's permit is particularly valuable because it allows him to haul to any point in California and not just to specific terminal points.

Attorneys were instructed to file briefs with the ICC, which will render a decision later this year.
