10 Spot Fires Set By Flaming Brakes Of Logging Truck

A series of 10 spot fires flared along the Tiller-Trail highway yesterday afternoon. State forest patrolmen said they were started by the flaming brakes of a logging truck en route to Medford.

The fires were first reported about 2:35 p.m. by people in the area who saw the truck go by, spreading flame onto both sides of the road. Workers at the Swanson Lumber company saw it, and put a fire crew to work immediately. The fires were nearly under control by the time state forest department crews arrived from Medford and McLeod, and the warden from Trail.

The identity of the truck driver was not learned, and it is possible he was not aware of the flames his truck was causing, although the brakes were burned completely out, and parts of them were found along the road. It is believed the emergency brake was left on by mistake.

The largest fire was about an acre, next-largest about a quarter-acre, with the others confined to small areas. They were scattered along the road for a mile and a half.

South Dakota Briefly Bolts Demo Conclave in Protest

Convention Hall, Chicago — (U.P.) — The first actual walkout in the Democratic Convention developed in the South—South Dakota, that is.

Six delegates angrily snatched up their state standard and stalked from the hall shortly before midnight, after accusing Permanent Chairman Sam Rayburn of "gross unfairness" for allowing two Louisiana delegates to vote for their entire delegation.

After a cooling-off period of less than an hour, the South Dakotans marched back in again, with George A. Bangs, chairman of the delegation, announcing, "We are back to stay."

The walkout stemmed from the long convention wrangle over enforcing the loyalty pledge against three Southern delegations. The South Dakotans opposed seating Virginia and did not like the way Rayburn ran the balloting on this point.
