Mr. Bray was in Japan temporarily during the war and decided then that it was a nice country but definitely in need of religious assistance. Since then he has obtained his Ph. D. degree and studied the Japanese language for a year in preparation for a return to Japan as a missionary.

He received his doctor's degree from the University of Chicago summer and since then has taken Japanese at the University of California.

Mr. Bray has had two pastorates in Oregon, but the local Methodist church will be his home church. Before returning to college for further graduate work he preached at St. Helens and at Tigard.

Mr. Bray will teach at the Kwanse Gakuin university school of theology. The university is at Nishinomiya, Japan.

SUDDEN PERSONALITY CHANGE INDICATES POOR ADJUSTMENT

Personality changes, within a short period of time, are symptoms of trouble. People change their personalities slightly as they grow older but the changes come slowly and gradually. This woman should be on her guard for possible trouble ahead:

(Q) "I used to be so pleasant and friendly. Now, since I'm married, I'm forever fighting and holding a grudge. Occasionally, I refuse to talk, especially at home, and for several days I hardly say a word. Then I am automatically come out of it. Am I going out of my mind? Is there anything I can do to help myself?"

(A) At the moment, you are not going out of your mind but there is no guarantee that you won't, some time in the future, unless you do something to correct the cause of the change that has come over you since your marriage.

The best thing you can do is to tell your doctor the whole story. After a complete physical check-up, he will know if there is some physical or glandular cause for the change. If he recommends that you see a psychiatrist, follow his advice. He may feel that you are not making a satisfactory adjustment to your marriage and that you need professional help along those lines.

When a person is poorly adjusted to some situation, whether it be school, work, or marriage, the effect carries over to every area of his life. Usually tending are asked to bring a personal service and a covered dish. Robert Ellis, superintendent, heads the committee which planned the picnic.

It makes him quarrelsome and vindictive. In your case, you show some of the characteristic symptoms of maladjustment. And because these symptoms have developed since your marriage, it suggests that the trouble will be found in the adjustment you have made to your marriage.

Not wanting to talk to people, especially the members of your family, looks as if the chief chip on your shoulder concerns them. If you truly loved your husband and the other members of your family, you would not want to hurt them. Are you sure that you are as happy in your marriage as you had anticipated and that you are not suffering from disillusionment?

Congressional Quiz

Questions and Answers on What Goes on at the Capital
Furnished by Congressional Quarterly News Features

Q—When I was in Washington I noticed the Senators have a busy subway to shuttle them from their office building to the Capitol. What does that cost the public?

A—In fiscal 1952 it cost about \$2,600. But evidently the Senators have been getting some rough rides, because this year Congress increased the amount to \$10,100, to allow \$7,500 for repair and replacement of track.

Q—How much of the public purse did Congress take this year for its own expenses?

A—The Legislative Appropriation bill, through which Congress pays its own bills, carried \$76,849,392 for the 12 months starting July 1, but only about \$24 million was actually for the House, \$13,400,000 for the Senate. The rest went to the Government Printing Office (\$22,000,000), Library of Congress (\$9,000,000), and for building and grounds upkeep and improvements (\$7,600,000).

Q—Does a Vice President have much of a chance of being President?

A—History gives him a one-third chance, since 10 of the 32 Presidents first were Veps. Only three Vice-Presidents—John Adams (1797-1801), Jefferson (1801-1809) and Van Buren (1837-1841)— vaulted to the Presidency by means of election. Seven others succeeded to the White House because of death. Three of these—Theodore Roosevelt (1901-1909), Coolidge (1923-1929), and Truman (1945 to present)— later won election to full terms.

Q—Have the Democrats or Republicans been in power the most years?

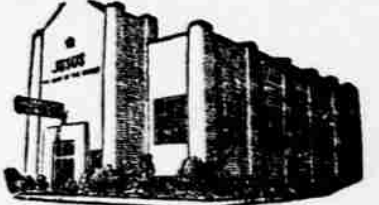
A—Since the Grand Old Party came into being in 1856 it has been at the helm 52 years. Since 1856, Democrats have held power — the Presidency, that is — 44 years. Republicans occupied the White House for the longest span — 24 years. Longest period of Democratic control is the present, which started 20 years ago.

Q—I notice in CQ Weekly Report the official designation of the tideland bill vetoed by the President is "S J Res 20." What does S J Res mean?

A—Senate Joint Resolution. Joint resolutions originating in the House are H J Res. Regular bills are HR (House of Representatives) or S (Senate) and numbered in order of introduction. All these can become law, if passed by both chambers and either approved by the President or passed over his veto. Congress uses other legislative forms — simple and concurrent

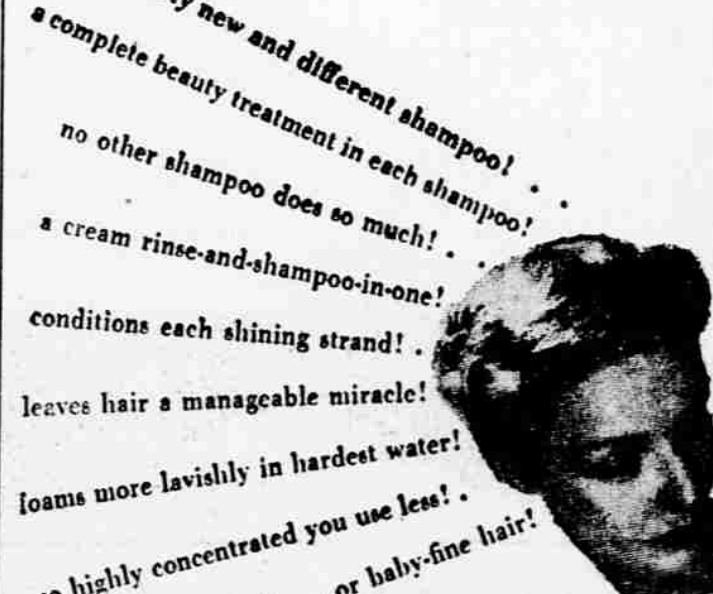
