As usual, we started out on our vacation by bus because it is convenient and economical and then vow never to do it again if Greyhound doesn't do something about instructing the help in schedules. Every time, or almost every time, we ask a bus depot employee about schedules, or fares, it turns out later that we were given the wrong information. But then, if we worked for Greyhound, we'd probably never be able to remember all that information either.

In many ways, it is more interesting to travel by bus than by train or plane. The people who travel by bus, whether because circumstances force them to or by preference, seem to be less inhibited than other travelers. For a time Monday night we thought the trip north was going to be dull, but it turned out otherwise. For one thing, five people who spoke no English sat near us, and while we understood only a few words of their conversation during the trip, we found them most interesting to watch and we enjoyed hearing them talk together. We've always liked to hear the Spanish language spoken, it seems so musical, and the small boy of the five travelers rattled on incessantly in a sweet voice.

A great many people do it, but it must be a bit terrifying to set out to travel in a land without being able to speak the language. However, these travelers, apparently a family, seemed to be enjoying themselves and not concerned or anxious in any way. The man of the group listened intently to directions and instructions from the driver and seemed to understand, although he could speak no English, and would then translate to the remainder of the party. The boy, just like all small boys, started on a tour of the Portland depot the minute he was inside and was soon busily examining everything with great interest.

Portland seems to be enjoying a busy tourist summer. We had not bothered to make hotel reservations and were somewhat alarmed when the hotel clerk said he had no empty rooms. It was early morning, however, and guests were leaving, so he sent us up to a room which had just been vacated, saying he would send a maid right up. It turned out that the occupants had not left yet but the woman in the room invited us in and said they would be leaving in a matter of moments.

"I don't mind in the slightest," she said kindly. "In fact, we did the same thing ourselves yesterday. It must make the management happy when a hotel is so busy the guests over-lap!"

Going up in the elevator, we noted with interest a tray with a bottle of ginger ale, a bottle of beer and a bowl of ice. When we inquired if for heaven's sake was somebody drinking at 8:30 a.m. the bell hop and elevator operator groaned and then laughed. "We have a permanent guest," the operator said, "who breakfasts every morning on a bottle of ginger ale and a bottle of beer." We all then shuddered and agreed that it was a strange, if not downright revolting custom.

As usual the time in the city flies by on wings and half the things we planned to do, go undone. We did visit the Portland Art Museum to see the collection of old paintings by Italian, Dutch and Flemish masters given to the museum by the Kress estate. Portland artists and art patrons are exceedingly grateful for the gift, for the paintings are of great antiquity and beauty and said to be valued at more than two million dollars.

Even though the paintings were done three and four centuries ago, the colors are still strong and rich, particularly the red and orange tones, and our companions on the tour agreed that the early European artists "had something" which most of the moderns lack. When we went from the Kress collection into a room where modern works were displayed they seemed cheap, tawdry and lacking in meaning by comparison. We particularly looked at the controversial modern entitled "Bird Depressed by the Winter of 1946" (or some other year) and felt that the bird

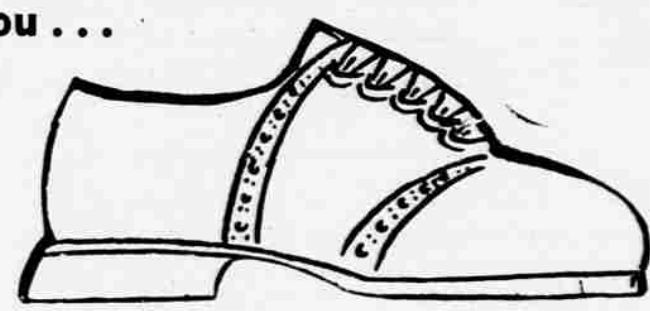
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
