CAB Examiners Slated To Resume Rate Hearing

Portland — (U.P.)—Examiner Paul N. Pfeiffer of the Civil Aeronautics board said Saturday that a hearing on Alaska air cargo rates would be resumed at a second session August 25 in Washington, D. C.

Pfeiffer adjourned a five-day hearing here Friday after hearing final pleas of Portlanders for equal rates to Alaska with Seattle-Tacoma, Wash., points.

There Was No Plane Crash--The Story Of A Rumor's Birth

The Shady Cove area did not have an airplane crash Saturday—fragmentary reports and rumors to the contrary.

Reports of the so-called crash were widespread yesterday morning. It took a little time, and a few telephone calls, to track down the rumor. Here's what happened:

One of the Ground Observers Corps, organized here to spot aircraft and report them to the Air Force filter center in Portland, spied a high-flying airplane Saturday morning. In following his instructions, he called his telephone operator—in this case the one at Eagle Point. These aircraft messages have a priority, and the operator broke in on a conversation between a Shady Cove telephone and one in Medford.

To Report 'Flash'
She asked them to relinquish the line, that there was an emergency call—"aircraft flash," which is what the reports are called.

The telephone user in Medford immediately hung up to free the line. But he misunderstood the last word, thinking the operator said "crash," rather than "flash." He immediately started calling to find out about the "crash." As he phoned, the agencies he called got to work trying to check on an airplane crash.

The Mail Tribune, notified by this time, called the control tower at the airport, which had no missing aircraft reports, and which later called back to verify that all Medford aircraft were accounted for.

Officer Checks
The state police had heard the report, but had no further word. An officer in the area checked every source possible and radioed the Medford office that he could find no crash.

A mobile unit of the Southern Oregon Conservation and Tree Farm association's radio service was queried, and the operator

checked in the area also. No results.

The Mail Tribune's correspondent in Shady Cove was called. She, too, had heard the rumor, but had no facts.

Finally, a call was put through to the Eagle Point operator (there is none in Shady Cove) who explained what had happened—it was a "flash," not a "crash."

New Industrial Era Predicted for Mexico

Mexico City —(U.P.)—A huge hydroelectric project now under way in Mexico's Papaloapan Basin is envisioned by National Bank officials as the forerunner of a new industrial and agricultural era for the country.

The gigantic government development program will cover 45,450 square kilometers in the states of Oaxaca, Puebla and Veracruz. It includes construction of dams, irrigation facilities, schools, hospitals, hydroelectric plants and a network of highways.

At least 11 large fruit packing plants have been planned by the Papaloapan commission.

The National Bank of Mexico said the project "opens a new horizon in the agricultural and industrial development of the country, which will serve to stimulate the government and private industry to take advantage of the economic possibilities of other similar basins."

Catering Service Denies Liability For Mass Poisoning

Portland —(U.P.)—An attorney for Bill's Delicatessen, the catering service that prepared food which poisoned scores of labor union picknickers here July 12, said Saturday the service denies liability for the incident and is rejecting claims for damages.

A spokesman for Pacific Employers Insurance company which insures the delicatessen also reported that damage claims against the firm may run as high as \$10,000 but he said the insurance company was not accepting responsibility for the claims.

150 Claims
Some 150 claims averaging \$40 each have been filed against Pacific by member of the AFL Boilermakers union whose annual picnic was disrupted by a mass outbreak of food poisoning in Viking park.

The first civil action to reach circuit court was filed Friday by Connie G. Farrell, Portland. He seeks \$100 special damages and \$7500 general damages. Two more suits, similar to Farrell's may be filed Monday, according to a member of the Fertig and Colombo law firm.

Crux of the claims actions is the initial report on tests made of the food served at the picnic. Dr. Thomas L. Meador, Portland health officer, said the preliminary tests showed "poor handling and refrigeration of hams" allowed the development of staphylococcus organisms in the meat.
