

Argentina Shrouded In Mourning for Eva

Buenos Aires —(U.P.)— Argentina was shrouded in mourning Monday for its first lady, Mrs. Eva Peron, and thousands filed past her bier in a last tribute.

The wife of President Juan D. Peron died Saturday night after

them. Lamp posts were draped in black.

Radio and television stations broadcast only sacred music and funeral bulletins. Comedy programs were banned for the remainder of the mourning period.

Mountain of Flowers

The crowd Sunday heaped a veritable mountain of flowers outside the Labor Ministry building, where Mrs. Peron's coffin had been placed on a bier near the door of her former office.

Mrs. Peron died at the presidential residence after an 11-month illness. She underwent a major operation last November for an unspecified ailment and recently her condition became grave.

Medford Pilot Gains Mention in Article

Kenneth B. Owen, 27, of Medford, is one of several forest spraying pilots featured in an article in the Look magazine on the stands tomorrow.

The pilot team flies from New Brunswick, Canada, to protect a 300-square-mile timber area from budworms. Twenty-three planes are flown in this insect-control project jointly sponsored by the Province and the New Brunswick International Paper company.

TAKE HIM OR LEAVE HIM YOU CAN'T MAKE HIM OVER

When a person is in the wrong for something he has said or done, an apology is always in order. Whether the person to whom the apology is given will accept it or not is a different story. That is the problem facing the girl who wrote:

(Q) "I have been going out for six months with a boy in the service. He comes from another part of the country and is stationed near here. The other night I had a fight with him. I don't care for his friends as they haven't a high standard of character. When I tried to tell him this, he told me it was not my business and that he would go with whom he pleases. This

hurt me because, as he sees these people, his character will go downhill. He is already different from what he was when I met him. Should I apologize, since I started the fight?"

(A) By all means apologize to him. It was none of your business and you had no right to tell him with whom he should associate. Only if you are engaged to him should you feel free to discuss such personal matters.

You can't be sure that he will forgive but it is worth a try, if you sincerely care for him. But stop trying to reform him. You will lose him for sure if you put yourself in the role of his guardian. There is nothing a man resents more than having a girl he goes with tell him what to do.

There is an old saying that is usually true to form. This is "birds of a feather flock together." He may not have changed since you first knew him as much as you think. He probably went with the same type of people in his home town.

You saw him as you wanted to see him, not as he really was.
