Gradual Reduction Work Week to 30 Hours Proposed

Chicago—(U.P.)—A high ranking union official here has proposed a gradual reduction in the work week to 30 hours.

Michael J. Boyle of the International Brotherhood of Electricians, (AFL), said the nation may be in for another depression.

Boyle, vice president of the nation's 6th district, voiced the opinion at a meeting of district leaders.

"For over a decade our industrial economy has been on a high level of production and consumption due to a war-time and defense program," he said. "As we adjust to a peace-time production, a decline from this high level is certain. Such a decline may well carry within it the seeds of another depression."

Boyle said millions of workers have been recruited and trained to meet the needs of expanded production and would be thrown into idleness by a decline of serious proportions.

He called for preventive measures, and said that "one very practical and highly important measure is to reduce the length of the work day and work week."

"We propose that the present standard of five eight-hour work days be reduced gradually to five six-hour work days without any reduction in take-home pay," he said.

"In certain industries such as transportation, where it may not be feasible or practical to readily so reduce the work day, an eight-hour work day may be retained but the work week reduced from five to four days."

Woman Faints After Punching Policeman

Maryville, Tenn.—(U.P.)—A young mother of two children became so excited when she saw her husband being led to jail that she struck the arresting officer with her fist. The punch was leveled at a 200-pound highway patrolman, John Marshall, who admitted "the lick kinda stung me."

Marshall said the 100-pound assailant must have felt the effects of the attack, too. She fainted.

Psychologists Ease Billboard Reading

Ithaca, N. Y.—(U.P.)—Psychologists at Cornell university have decided how to make billboard advertising easier to read.

Their studies showed. The brand name should be as close as possible to the left of the slogan or sentence. Words become progressively harder to read the farther they are to the right of the message.

The brand name should be distinctive in size, color or shape from other words. However, if the difference is too great, both it and the rest of the sentence become harder to read.

Lines, arrows or curves, especially in a different color from the words, "pull" attention to the brand name and sentence. A square, circle or other outline in the same color surrounding the brand name cut down legibility.

Canyonville Bible Academy Open Sept. 8

Canyonville—The Christian high school, Canyonville Bible academy, has announced its opening date this year as September 8. Students are expected from many states and from Alaska.

This academy is the regional high school of the Assemblies of God. It is endorsed by that denomination's educational department, but is interdenominational in spirit and welcomes students from other churches.
