More Deer To Be Killed In Michigan

Lansing, Mich.—(U.P.)—Michigan this fall will start a three-year program of deer herd improvement by permitting more deer to be killed by hunters.

The program, restricted to the lower peninsula, is aimed at reducing deer population in over foraged areas and as a result cut down the number of deer perishing yearly from starvation and freezing.

At the same time, the smaller herds will be better fed and produce healthier fawns.

Conservation experts believe the cycle will continue successfully under careful guidance and restore to Michigan a robust deer herd.

Legislature Agrees

Discretionary powers to permit taking of bucks, does and fawns in starvation areas were granted to the conservation commission by the 1952 legislature. It came only after an eight-year uphill battle between experts and conservation-minded sportsmen and balky law makers.

Diehards in the legislature still maintain that does and fawns will be slain promiscuously and hint that the proposed anti-starvation campaign may do more damage to the deer herd than Michigan's longest and coldest winter.

Michigan has a deer herd estimated at 1,000,000 with between 10,000 to 50,000 dying annually from rigors of winter.

Special seasons already have been tried in some Michigan areas, primarily at the insistence of farmers in areas where large deer herds have invaded orchards and fields when other forage failed.

Trial Plan Worked

During special seasons, bucks, does and fawns were taken during a seven-to-ten day period after the general buck season.

There were indications after several trial years that the program was cutting down deer damage to farms and at the same time reducing the deer population to a point where there was enough food for all and healthier deer resulted.

Experts believe that rebuilding the deer herd is a problem which will take more than three years but hope to show concrete proof of improvement during the trial three years and win an extension.

SWITCHING MADE EASY

Japan Peace Treaty Pleases Most Citizens

Tokyo — (U.P.) — Seventy per cent of Tokyoites were satisfied with the Japanese peace treaty signed in San Francisco last September, according to an official public opinion survey here.

The opinion poll was conducted by the prime minister's office covering 1,000 men and women between the ages of 20 and 59. The results indicated that some 70 per cent considered the peace treaty satisfactory for a defeated nation. Twelve per cent found it unsatisfactory even for a defeated nation and the remainder not satisfactory but acceptable.

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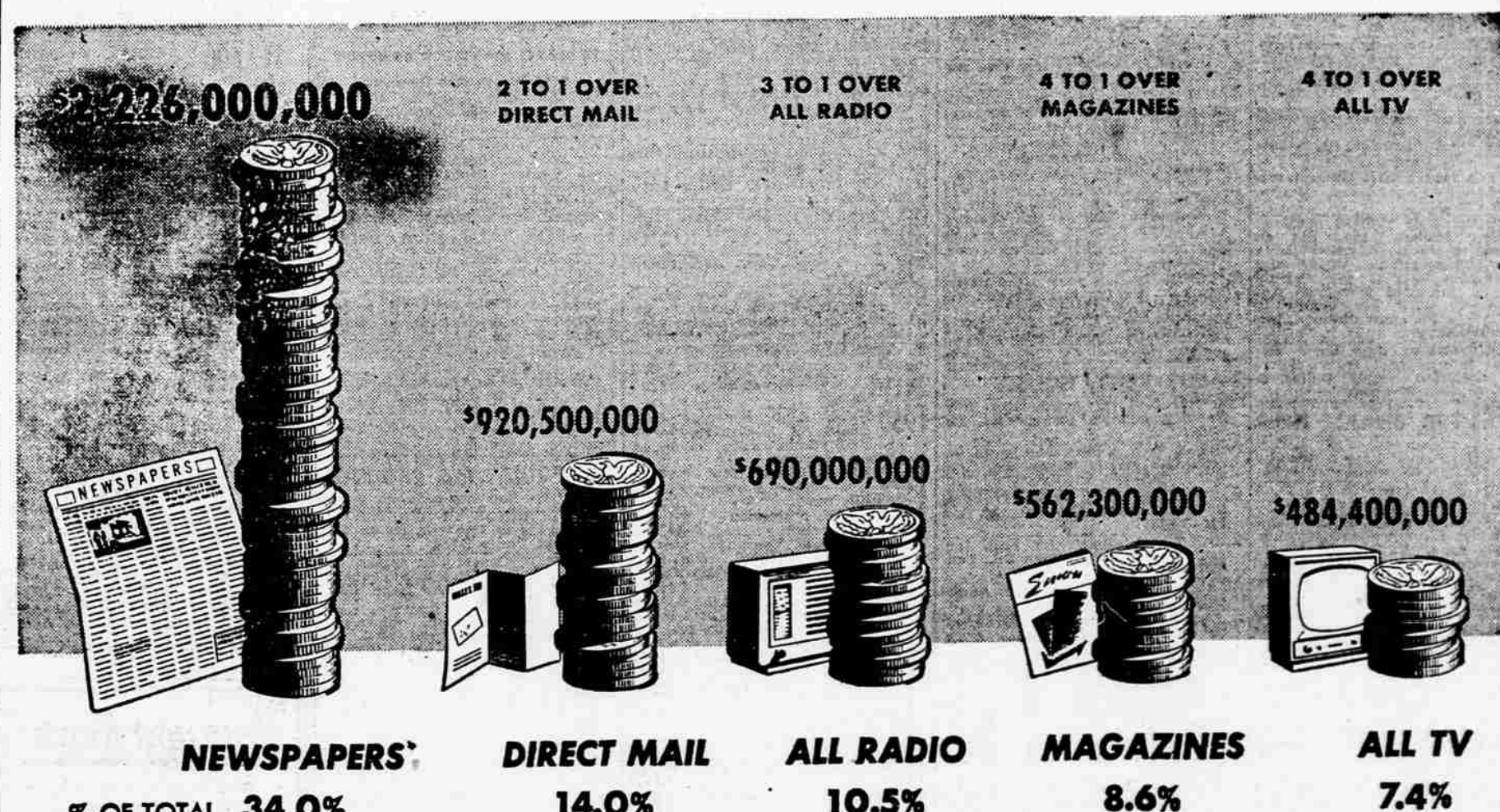
