Portland's Vaughn Street Area Waits Redevelopment

Portland — (UP) — The city of Portland's proposed \$8,000,000 Vaughn street area, clearance project was on the way to becoming a fact Tuesday.

Circuit Judge James W. Crawford, in a ruling handed down Monday, upheld the constitutionality of Oregon's urban redevelopment law, which sanctions the proposed project, to develop the 44-block area for industrial purposes.

Suit Brings Ruling

The ruling was presented in a suit attacking legality of the act brought by Mr. and Mrs. H. J. Foeller, owners of a residence in the area to be redeveloped. The city of Portland, which initiated the proposal for the project, and the Portland Housing Authority, which is to direct the development of the area, were defendants in the suit.

Unlawful Power Charged

The Foellers contended the law violates the constitution in that it constitutes an unlawful delegation of legislative power, authorizes the granting of privileges to purchasers or lessees, and confer upon a housing authority the power of eminent domain.

When he dismissed the case, Judge Crawford said the Vaughn street sector is a "blighted area" within the meaning of the act and on the basis of investigation and research a redevelopment plan has been proposed which is entirely within the authority conferred by the act.

Gault said there were no details given as to where he had been or what he had been doing, except what Hurst spoke to the driver who gave him a lift into Medford regarding finding a job somewhere when he had disappeared.
