Cash, Assessed Value of Public Utilities Revealed

Salem — (U.P.) — The State Tax Commission has issued its list of the full cash value and assessed value of public utility property in Oregon as determined by the commission.

The report was eagerly awaited by all the counties because it is on that report that the counties make their assessments on public utility property.

Commissioner Carl W. Chambers, head of the commission's utilities division, said full cash value for the state in 1951 was \$518,157,356.63 and in 1952, \$556,794,942.48. The total assessed value in 1951 was \$261,359,243.15, and in 1952, \$262,226,686.48.

The figures by counties includes:

Jackson: Full cash value: 1951, \$21,778,407.32; 1952, \$24,150,999.78; assessed value: 1951, \$11,324,771.81; 1952, \$11,592,479.89.

Josephine: Full cash value: 1951, \$7,420,269.83; 1952, \$8,039,715.44. Assessed value: 1951, \$3,635,932.21; 1952, \$3,698,269.10.

Klamath: Full cash value: 1951, \$43,391,517.81; 1952, \$43,603,909.74. Assessed value: 1951, \$17,356,607.12; 1952, \$16,417,407.50.

According to Mrs. Daniel Stewart, leader of the hobby group, there may be a small sum added later, as one or two members, unable to get their hobbycraft articles to the carnival, have promised a cash donation instead.

Amusement concessions operated by the Lady Lions, and the fortune-telling booth conducted by Mrs. Kitty Rich of the Rebekahs, and her niece, Miss Lily Quinn, proved particularly popular with the crowd of about 100 people attending. The soda pop stand operated by Mrs. Hannah Routh for the Home Extension unit did a land-office business, and the ice cream and home-made cakes booth of the Health unit attracted many customers.

The square dance scheduled by the Home Extension unit was cancelled and admission charges refunded when only a handful of people were attracted to it.

It is planned to start fixing up the club room as soon as a carpenter can be obtained. Plans have been made to install a sink and a cook-stove. Furnishings needed for the hall are chairs, lamps and dishes for serving food. The room will be available to any local club wishing to hold meetings there, with no rental charge other than the cost of lights and fuel.
