Arvel Lee Nash, 1242 Morrow road, told the police yesterday that the tools reported burglarized from the Morton Milling company, 10 West Jackson street, had been sold to him. He said he bought the tools from a man identifying himself as Robert L. Terrier.

Nash recognized the \$35 set of tools as the one stolen when he read of the burglary in The Mail Tribune. The tools belonged to Everett B. Music, who worked at the milling company.

Nash told police he was working on a truck at Medford Motor and Equipment company, 502 South Riverside avenue, when the man offered to sell him the tools. He gave him a check for \$17.

Music said a man named Robert L. Terrier had worked at the Morton company until last Saturday. Another employee, Billy Robert Smith, told police Terrier had said when laid off that he might have to steal if he couldn't get a new job. Smith gave an identification of Terrier that was identical with that Nash gave in describing the man who sold him the tools.
