High Protein Food for Animals Seen Possibility

Berkeley, Calif. (U.P.) — Production of high protein food for animals is a possibility raised by an investigation by research engineers of the University of California here.

A grant from the National Institutes of Health of the U.S. Public Health Service partly supports the investigation, which is concerned with the problems of sewage treatment by means of oxidation ponds and particularly the role of the microscopic single-celled plants called algae.

Findings thus far suggest the possibility of a process which may simplify the expensive task of disposing of wastes and at the same time provide a valuable new source of food for domestic animals and also industrial raw materials.

Treating Waste Costly
University engineers point out that as the population increases the disposal of waste becomes an increasingly serious problem. It also is costly.

A large part of the cost of sewage treatment is the cost of supplying oxygen which, in ordinary treatment processes, is provided by expensive pumps and other installations. University scientists have found that all oxygen required for sewage treatment in oxidation ponds can be supplied by green algae growing in the sewage media.

In existing oxidation pond operation, the sewage is processed in the ponds for about 25 days. The university researchers have found that, within limits, the faster the sewage is put through their apparatus, the faster the algae grow. The faster they grow the faster they produce oxygen and the faster they produce oxygen the faster the sewage is treated.

Process Is Quick
Under controlled conditions, the scientists have converted sewage almost completely into

grows continuously and is harvested daily.

Industrial organizations and research groups are seeking economically practicable ways of producing these plants. A stumbling block for these experimenters has been that growing algae in artificial cultures involves the addition of nitrogen and other expensive nutrients which push the costs up beyond practicable limits. The proposed "sewage farms" would require no such additions because all the growth elements are present in the sewage.

The Bermuda cedar is misnamed, says the National Geographic Society. It is actually a juniper of a type found nowhere else in the world.
