

Farouk Says He's Just Poor Man Who Doesn't Know Where To Go

Isle of Capri—(U.P.)—Ex-King Farouk of Egypt described himself Thursday as a relatively poor man who doesn't know where to go.

He said he would remain in Capri "for the moment" until he decides what to do but pointed out that "I am no longer a rich man." He said he and the exiled royal family will "live very simply" from now on.

Didn't Bring Fortune

The portly, former playboy monarch told his first press conference since losing his throne Saturday that he did not bring a fortune in treasure with him to this Italian island, and had no fortune hidden abroad. Reports of this nature, he said, "are completely false." The only thing he knew definitely about his future plans, he said, is that "I will not go behind the Iron Curtain."

"Those who say I will go to America, to England, to Switzerland, to the south of France, etc., know more than I do," he said after he, ex-Queen Nariman and their six-month-old son,

baby King Ahmed Fuad II, posed patiently for photographers.

Farouk shook off an early-morning toothache to meet the press. A Capri doctor called on him shortly after midnight when he complained of pains.

Reports of Wealth False

He told the newsmen "I am no longer a rich man and it is completely false that I brought a fortune out of Egypt, just as it is false that I have a fortune hidden abroad."

"My wife, my son and my daughters will live very simply. I know that they will smile at this. But you must consider that anyone who finds himself with less than he used to have considers himself poor."

"From the point of view of the very poor, I know that I can still be envied but I hope that from now on it can be envied without acrimony."

Guarded by Police

Farouk's 25-room 14-bathroom suite in the swank Eden Paradiso Hotel at Anacapri was guarded by a strong police detachment. He has rented three large sedans for his party.

To questions about his plans Farouk said: "We may remain here at Capri a few months, perhaps more, perhaps less."

It was announced that the assistant officer's position has not as yet been filled but applications are being received. Miss Alice Grace, present assistant juvenile officer, has resigned to accept a position at the Youth Center in Seattle, Wash., and expects to leave the middle of August. Frank Sawacki, juvenile officer for the past two years, left last week to accept a position with the University of California.

Upon motion made by Mrs. Inch of the county school office, a resolution was drawn to thank Sawacki and to extend to him the appreciation of the group for his "fine contribution to the community" and for his devotion, energy and wisdom while juvenile officer here.

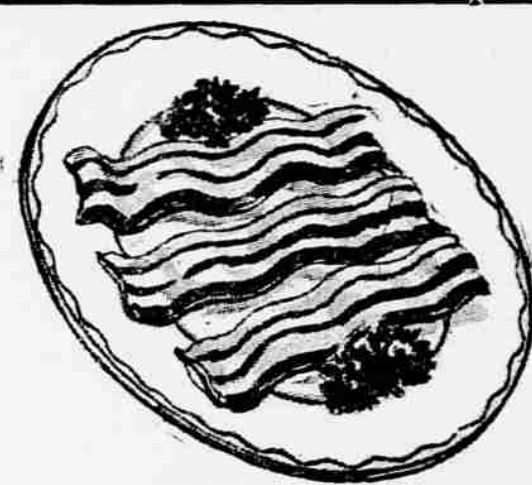
