Lee, McLane Lead Field In Olympics Diving and Swimming Competition

Helsinki (U.P.)—Two Americans got off to good starts in defense of their Olympic championships Thursday as Dr. Sammy Lee of Fresno, Calif., led the field in platform diving and Jimmy McLane of Akron, Ohio, qualified for the 1,500-meter freestyle swimming final.

Lee, a major in the Army Medical Corps, led the high dive competitors with a total of 55.91 points after the four morning dives. Two more afternoon dives will be made to determine the eight qualifiers for Friday's final.

Among Qualifiers

McLane and Bill Woolsey, an Ohio State student from Honolulu, were among the eight who qualified for Saturday's final in the 1,500-meter race. The 1,500-meter freestyle qualifiers were led by Shiro Hashizume of Japan, who set a new Olympic record of 18 minutes, 34 seconds in winning the first heat.

McLane, the Yale star who finished a disappointing seventh in Wednesday's 400-meter freestyle final, won the second heat in the 1,500-meter trials with a 19:09.3 clocking. He did not extend himself. McLane's time was the third fastest of the eight qualifiers.

Woolsey was clocked in 19:24.6 as he finished second in his heat to Jean Boiteux of France, who won the 400-meter race Wednesday. Boiteux, seeking an Olympic double, was timed in 19:12.3.

The four others who qualified for the 1,500-meter final were Patsy Okamoto of Brazil, winner of the third heat in 19:05.6; Heinz Lehmann of Germany, Godfrey Gremowski of Poland and Guitierrez of Mexico.

To Play for Fifth
In basketball, Chile beat Bulgaria, 60-53, and Brazil defeated France, 59-44. The winners earned the right to meet Friday for fifth place in the Olympic tournament.

Barbara Stark of Berkeley, Calif., was the only American to qualify for the finals of the women's 100-meter backstroke. She was given a chance to score points but was not regarded as a title threat.

Three finals were scheduled today in cycling—the 1,000-meter time trial, the 1,000-meter scratch, and the 2,000-meter tandem—but the U.S. had no chance to score points in any of them.

San Francisco (U.P.)—Seattle's Steve Nagy, a wee southpaw, and San Diego's venerable right-hander, Jack Salveson, were offered Thursday as a study in contrast.

Pitching veterans of the Pacific Coast league, both Nagy and Salveson went to opposite extremes to achieve different results Wednesday night.

Nagy Loses One-Hitter
Nagy pitched a nine-inning one-hitter, only to lose to Portland, 2-1, in the second game of a double-header. And Salveson, recording his first triumph since June 15th, fooled no one and allowed 13 hits but his Padres defeated Sacramento, 5-2.

The one hit off Nagy was a bunt by Eddie Barr in the sixth inning.

Portland also took the opener from Seattle, 5-1. In other battles, San Francisco got four hits but defeated Hollywood, 4-2. And Los Angeles downed Oakland, 6-4.

Loose Support Hurts
Here's how Nagy lost. He had a one-run lead in the sixth, when Barr legged out the bunt. Frank Austin tried to sacrifice him to second, but Seattle catcher Claude Christie, after fielding the ball, threw it into Austin's back. Barr sped for third, where Rocco Krsnich muffed a throw.

Barr came home and Austin pulled up at third.

Austin scored the winning run as Joe Brovia grounded out.

Thomas Returns To Coast League
Portland (U.P.)—Leo Thomas, ex-Beaver third baseman, was expected back in Portland's Vaughn street ball park Friday night.

The former Portlander, who has been playing with the Chicago White Sox, will replace Rocco Krsnich in the Seattle Rainier lineup, according to Bill Sweeney, Seattle manager.

Krsnich Wednesday was recalled by the White Sox and will head for Chicago as soon as Thomas reports to the Rainiers. Sweeney said Thomas was scheduled to arrive in Portland Friday morning and if he arrives as expected he will open at third for the Rainiers in their game with the Beavers.

Thomas compiled a batting average of .310 and knocked in 146 runs for the Beavers last year. He has been hitting .223 for the Chicago team, who obtained him from St. Louis earlier this season.

Saxton Tops Virgil Akins
Chicago (U.P.)—They say you find out how good a fighter is the first time he is really hurt, and by that rule unbeaten welterweight Johnny Saxton looked like a mighty good battler Thursday.

The New York Negro was slammed to the canvas for the first time in his career Wednesday night, although that career had extended through 30 bouts and carried him to fourth ranking among the world's welterweights.

The knockdown came with dramatic suddenness in the opening seconds of his bout against Virgil Akins of St. Louis, who is ranked third among the lightweights. A two-handed flurry by Akins, a ripping right to the jaw and Saxton, the 2 to 1 favorite, was on the floor.

He was up at the count of two, but had to take the mandatory eight-count. He lasted out that round, and then took charge—throwing plenty of leather and winning the unanimous 10-round decision.

Studs Use Big Inning To Blast Weed, 16-9
The Medford Cheney Studs went wild in the seventh inning here last night to score 13 runs and blast Weed's Northern California league leaders by a 16 to 9 score. The Studs were trailing 9 to 2 at the start of the inning, which saw them send 16 men to bat.
