Honeybees Don't Need Dictator

Riverside, Calif. (U.P.) — When it comes to regimented societies, no hard-working dictator has yet touched the honeybee.

Dr. Stanley E. Flanders, professor of biological control at the University of California's citrus experiment station here, said the bees' society is so completely regimented it doesn't even need a dictator.

Everything is automatic. The social organization of bees, Dr. Flanders said, is built on a complex system of reflexes, and year after year each brood of bees regulates the sex of the following brood.

Even the queen bee, despite her vaunted reputation is nothing more than an egg-laying machine.

Whether her eggs will become male or female bees is a matter of hydrostatic pressure within the queen, Dr. Flanders said. She moves along over the wax cells built by the worker bee colony, depositing eggs as she goes, and a function she can perform off and on for about four years.

If the wax cell in which she lays an egg is worker bee size, she lays a fertilized egg. If it is one of the larger, drone size, she lays an unfertilized egg, which becomes a male, or drone. She also drops fertilized eggs into the small number of extra-large, queen-size cells and they hatch into queens simply because they are fed more and grow bigger.

The first queen hatched opens the cells of the others and destroys them.

Puerto Rico Resting Place Of Famed Spanish Explorer

United Press Staff Correspondent. San Juan, P.R. (U.P.) — The remains of Juan Ponce de Leon, famed Spanish explorer who died in Havana, Cuba, 431 years ago this month, rests here in the Cathedral of St. John the Baptist.

Although he perhaps is best remembered to the world for the discovery of Florida and his efforts to find a "fountain of youth" there, Ponce de Leon's name is linked intimately with this island.

He was with Columbus when the admiral of Spain discovered Puerto Rico on Nov. 19, 1493. After some ten years in nearby Santo Domingo, Ponce de Leon was sent to conquer Puerto Rico and look for gold.

In 1508 he established the first Christian settlement here—named Caparra — at a point across from what is now San Juan. In 1519 he became the island's first governor.

Buried in San Juan — Some history students find considerable irony in the fact that Ponce de Leon's final resting place is in San Juan—where he refused to live—rather than in Caparra.

During his residence in Puerto Rico, Ponce de Leon was involved in several stormy issues, including his right to be governor. The most persistent conflict — and one on which Ponce de Leon was ultimately outvoted — concerned the location of the capital.

His selection of the Caparra site apparently was unpopular from the beginning. Ponce de Leon was adamant and built a strong and imposing stone house for his family as evidence that he intended to stay in Caparra.

Despite their leader's example other settlers constructed less permanent dwellings of wood and mud, presumably in the belief they eventually would be moving.

Referendum Wins — As the controversy continued over the years, Ponce de Leon found it necessary to obtain a royal order forbidding transfer of the settlement. In 1519 Spanish authorities approved the move to San Juan after a referendum — possibly the first in the New World — was held among the settlers.

According to recent discoveries by historians of the U.S. National Park Service, Ponce de Leon cast the only vote in favor of Caparra. Despite his overwhelming defeat on the issue, he never lived in San Juan.

In 1513, while searching for

a legendary land called "Bimini," he had discovered Florida but the marvelous fountain with the youth-giving waters could not be found.

Nevertheless, Ponce de Leon was named governor of Florida by King Ferdinand, who also conferred other titles and honors on him during Ponce's visit to Spain in 1514.

Back to Florida — Back in Puerto Rico in 1515, he found himself in the middle of various controversies including growing opposition to the Caparra site.

The final ruling in favor of a move to San Juan possibly played an important part in Ponce de Leon's decision to undertake a new expedition to Florida in 1521. He was badly wounded in a battle with Florida Indians and was taken to Havana, where he died in June of that year.

He was buried in Havana but in 1559 his grandson brought his remains to San Juan. They were transferred to the cathedral in 1909.

The ruins of Ponce de Leon's house can still be seen in Caparra. Authorities have considered transferring his remains to the Caparra he loved so well — the conquistador's five-century-old bones might rest more peacefully there. But so far nothing has been done about it.
