Indian Affairs Probe in November

Washington — (U.P.) — A congressional investigation of the U. S. Bureau of Indian Affairs will be held in November after the general elections, it was reported here Friday.

Rep. John Murdock, D-Ariz., chairman of the House interior and insular affairs committee, said the hearing probably would be conducted by the subcommittee on Indian affairs.

The investigation was prompted by a resolution introduced during closing days of the last Congress by Rep. Harris Ellsworth, Roseburg, Ore., Republican.

Roseburg Man Gets Three-Year Term On Larceny Charge

James Charles Kent, 29, general delivery, Roseburg, was sentenced to three years in the state penitentiary by Judge H. K. Hanna yesterday for grand larceny, according to District Attorney Paul Haviland.

Kent was arraigned July 18 and pleaded guilty to the theft of a trailer house owned by C. R. Caster.

Court appearances were also made yesterday by Clarence Myers, 57, route 1, box 101, Eagle Point, and Herman John Newark, a transient whose last address was the Crater hotel, Medford. Myers pleaded guilty to contributing to the delinquency of a minor on July 27 and Newark pleaded guilty to stealing \$146 from Albert R. Miles on July 31, according to the district attorney's information and waiver of indictment.

James Junior Crowell, 33, Sudan, Texas, who pleaded guilty to burglary not in a dwelling on July 7, withdrew his plea yesterday and was given time to obtain an attorney, according to the district attorney. A trial is set for sometime in December.

Johnston Stores Plan Anniversary Program

Eve Prentice's accordion band will perform tomorrow during Johnston Stores' anniversary celebration, according to Owner R. T. Johnston. The celebration today and Saturday at the auto supply store, 112 South Riverside avenue, notes Johnston's first year in business here.

Garbage Collection Plans Under Study at Eagle Point

Eagle Point — A report and discussion on alternative proposals for collection of Eagle Point's garbage will be given at an August 5 council meeting, according to Mayor Fred M. Bruegger.

The mayor pointed out that there is no permanent garbage pickup system operating at the present time and that the council is considering two proposals for the city.

Councilmen To Report
A committee composed of Councilmen O. E. Henderson, Fred Arens and Alfred Overdick will report on both proposals. One suggestion has been to assess each water meter a flat 50-cent monthly charge, which would raise about \$100 a month and would entitle each person to weekly pickup service. The other alternative is on a voluntary basis at \$1.25 a month, or occasional pickups at 25 cents and up, depending on amount.

Mayor Bruegger said one of the two alternatives would have to be selected soon because of the sanitation problems involved. He said the council is working hard on the problem and will select the most equitable solution for the majority of users in the city.

Collection of the town's garbage has been voluntary in the past and the collectors have quit because this basis didn't provide enough money to offset the expense of collection. Garbage was collected for July on a voluntary basis by Joseph (Buster) Whipple but he is unable to continue the collection unless at least \$100 a month is assured. Lack of revenue under the voluntary system has led the council and mayor to seek other means to provide a base amount in order that the town may have adequate service.

Public Dump Unfeasible
A past method, that of a public dump, is not feasible, Mayor Bruegger said, because people "abuse the privilege by scattering the garbage instead of dumping in the pit, including dumping in the creek." He cited this as expensive to maintain because the dump then has to be cleaned up and imposes an unsightly problem for passing motorists on the road. He added that dumping in the creek and other reported violations for dumping in open lots were in direct violation of

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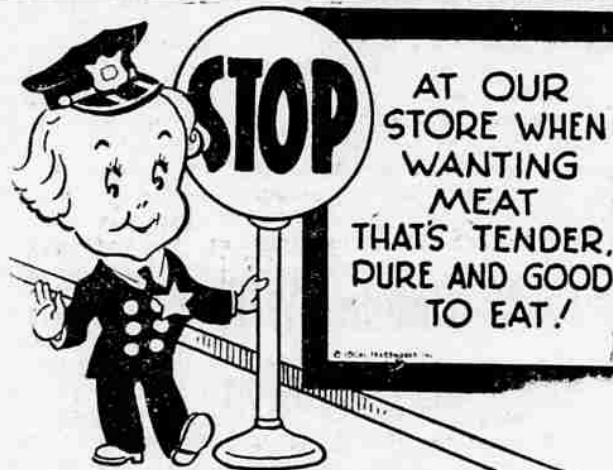
