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Stones in California When Earthquake Hit

Mr. and Mrs. Luther Stone, 70 Janney lane, who returned to Medford from California Sunday, were in Los Angeles when the first earthquake took place.

They said that they were asleep on the 14th floor of the Mayflower hotel when they were awakened by the shaking. Mr. Stone said that the building swayed, rattled like someone was shaking the furniture, and then there was an explosion as shop windows shattered.

The Stones went downstairs to the coffee shop where they said many of the guests were standing in night clothes, and women still had their hair in curlers. Some dashed out into the street in their panic. The building elevator was out of order because of the earthquake, so the hotel guests had to use the stairs. The Stones remarked about the noise caused by burglar alarms being set off, and said some alarms rang for three hours.

Copper-Nickel Ore Deposits Near Here Studied in Report

Results of an investigation of copper-nickel deposits at the Shamrock mine, 28 miles north of Medford, are announced in a current report of the United States bureau of mines. The bureau discovered the ore cannot easily be concentrated into separate nickel and copper products.

The investigation was started 2½ years ago as part of the bureau's continuing effort to develop sources of critical and strategic minerals. The project included trenching, drifting and diamond drilling in the area.

Although the Shamrock ore was declared "not amenable to concentration" into separate nickel and copper products, 90 per cent of the copper and nickel was recovered in a low-grade bulk sulfide concentrate accounting for 40 per cent of the weight of the ore. Further tests are planned to learn if this concentrate can be treated further.

The Shamrock mine, on a steep hillside overlooking Evans creek, has had no production. New owners in 1948 revealed encouraging widths of copper-nickel sulfide ore, but they lacked the capital to continue work on the property. The bureau of mines carried on the development.

The report shows the bureau's 1,650 feet of bulldozer trenching disclosed a separate surface deposit at least 200 feet long, 200 feet deep and five to 38 feet wide, south of the mine deposit. The mine deposit is at least 100 feet long, 100 feet deep and one to 25 feet wide, it was reported.
