Hostesses for the event were Mrs. Dave Bregren and Mrs. John Fuitin.

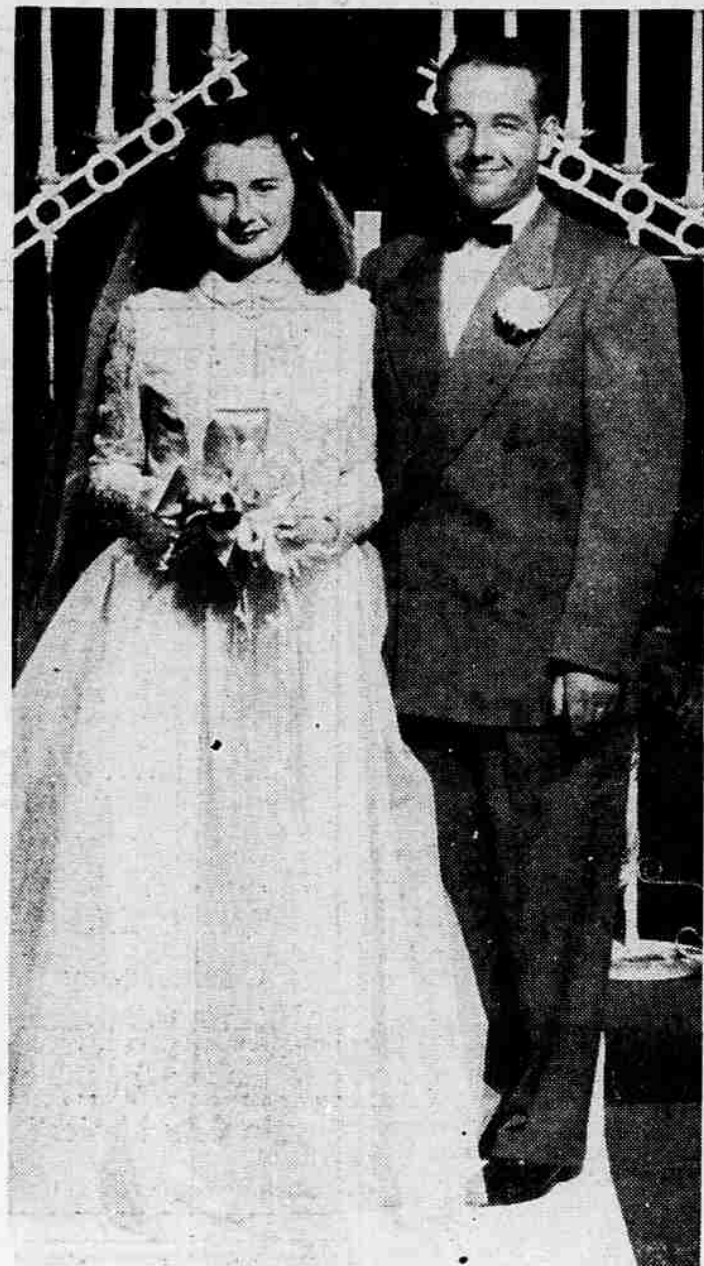
Mr. Owenby is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Owenby, Peabody, Wash.

Adelle Davis Says American Diet Poor, Causes Diseases

Adelle Davis, author and nutritionist, said she is "very pessimistic" about the future health of Americans because we are failing to eat the proper diet, when she lectured to about 80 people Thursday evening at the YMCA.

"We're in a worse way today than we've ever been in our lives," she said. "Billions of dollars are being spent on propaganda on foods that are harmful to the health. I think we are going to have loads more cancer, I think we are going to have loads more infantile paralysis. Living Foods groups such as you have here are going to have to fight the propaganda."

Adelle Davis told of the basic rules to apply when planning a diet to keep your health up to par. The first is to supply the body needs with the basic vitamins and minerals, and the second is to keep the food as natural as possible.

"Nutrition is an awfully personal thing. It can affect you now or tomorrow," she said. "Nutrition doesn't mean eating bad food, it means eating better food than you've ever eaten in your life."

As she told of the need for the vitamins and minerals in the diet, she also told of ways to make the diet appetizing. The dietitian warned against trying to eat foods that do not appeal to one because he has heard they are healthful. Instead, she said, find a way of preparing the essential foods to suit the individual taste.

Adelle Davis talked for some time on the need for calcium in the American diet. She said that it has much to do with one's disposition, since it relaxes nerves and decreases pain. A lot of adolescent problems are due to lack of calcium, she said.

"We're just beginning to get our teeth into what the B vitamins can do," the nutritionist said. "They have much to do with keeping yourself young and healthy."

Several lecture cases of people who came to her needing help with their diets. She said one needs all of the vitamins every day to prevent malnutrition problems. She emphasized the importance of Vitamin C as a detoxifying agent in the body, and warned the listeners not to depend on the sun for Vitamin D.

"One of the reasons in all probability cancers grow is because of lack of Vitamin E," the dietitian said. "This vitamin seems to be very important in producing normal young. We have cancer spreading faster than ever among babies."

Adelle Davis praised the mother who feeds her children raw milk, fresh eggs and fresh vegetables, and said that cod liver oil is a "must" in the diet. "Everything about you is hooked up with nutrition," she said.

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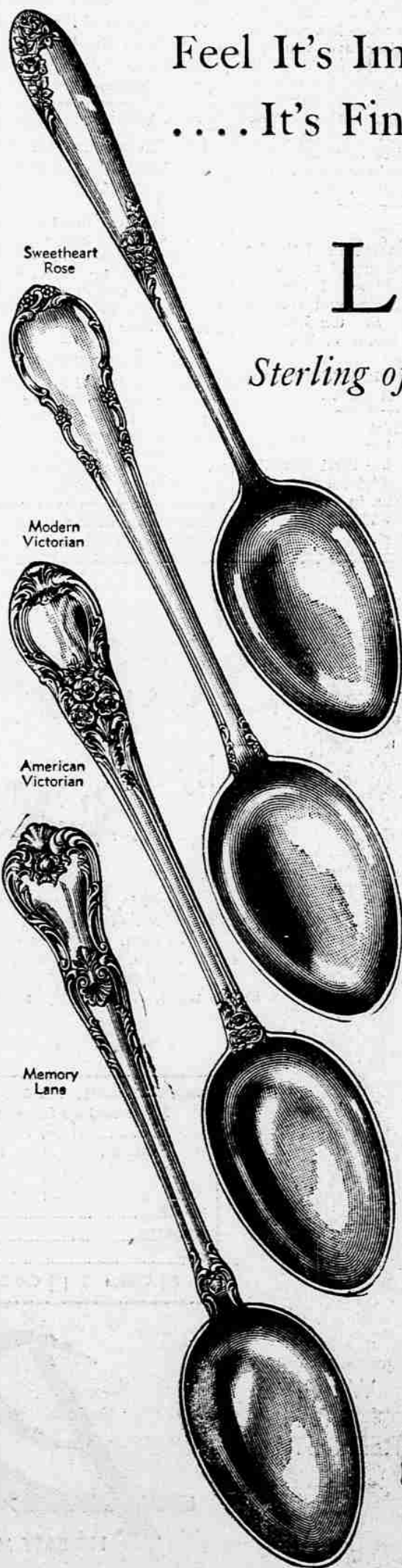

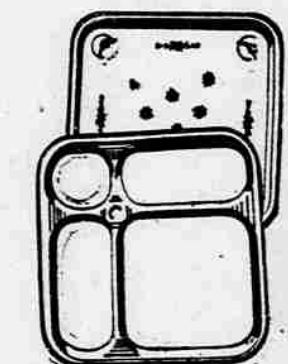


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
