Indiana Newspaper Sponsoring Watch For Flying Saucers

South Bend, Ind. — (U.P.) — Thousands searched Hoosier skies Saturday night hoping to catch a glimpse of the elusive "flying saucers" reported in scattered sections of the state during the past two weeks.

The mass sky watch, sponsored by the South Bend Tribune, and its radio station WSBT was coordinated with Air Force radar teams, astronomers and police.

The saucers, described as "glowing discs" were seen most recently in central Indiana.

Columbus Policeman Clarence Arbuckle said he answered numerous telephone calls from persons reporting lights in the sky. Arbuckle said he finally went outside himself and saw what looked like, "a light bulb headed north, going fast."

At Vincennes, Hillary Vieck, reported an object resembling a saucer zigzagging across the sky at high speed — in daylight. Vieck said it was silver in color and was visible for 20
