Gov. Stevenson Pays Quiet Visit To Lincoln's Home

Springfield, Ill. — (U.P.) — Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson paid a quiet visit to the home of Abraham Lincoln one night last week in an effort to relive the experience of that Civil War president on the eve of the 1860 campaign. He spent an hour in the white frame house on Eighth street before midnight last Monday. He had been greeted earlier by a homecoming celebration upon his return from Chicago, where the Democrats nominated him for president.

Stevenson, long an unwilling candidate, looking like a man with a troubled conscience, thought of going to the house late Monday night.

Drove To Shrine — So he called a car and drove the few blocks from the executive mansion to the Lincoln home, now a shrine in this city, where almost every street corner has an association with Lincoln.

According to sources close to the governor, he had telephoned the custodian, Virginia Stuart Brown, to have the house opened. When he arrived, he dismissed the car, gained admittance and walked through the rooms. Then he stopped at the living room and sat in Lincoln's old rocking chair.

Sitting in the dark, Stevenson spent more than half an hour in meditation. He later told friends that he had relived the "agonies" of Lincoln and found it a tremendous experience.

Donald De Mag, 29, deaf epileptic from Burlington, and Francis Blair, 31, Fitchburg, Mass., were overpowered after state troopers had fired a dozen shots at them.

Longview Blaze Causes \$200,000 in Damages

Longview — (U.P.) — Fire destroyed the Pacific Mineral Products Corporation warehouse here Friday night with loss estimated at \$200,000.

The blaze swept through the 75 by 100 foot building, filled with insulating materials, while firemen stood by helplessly. There were no hydrants near the plant and only water available to battle the flames came from a booster tank on a fire truck.

No casualties were reported.

City Police Handle 158 Cases in July

The Medford police handled 158 cases during July according to the monthly report of Chief Cletious McCredie. Fifty of the cases were drunks.

The department conducted investigations in 30 accidents, six of them involving injuries. McCredie also reported five vagrancies, five stolen vehicles, 12 larcenies, seven burglaries, four disorderly conducts and a sex offense.

In addition to 1,251 tickets for motor violations, the department issued 319 traffic citations in July. There were 141 parking violations, 67 for violation of the basic rule, 32 for failure to stop, six for reckless driving and 4 for driving under the influence of alcohol.

Grand Prize winners were Walter S. Gillette, winner of a prime beef; and Winifred Mason, winner of the second prize, a radio-phonograph combination.

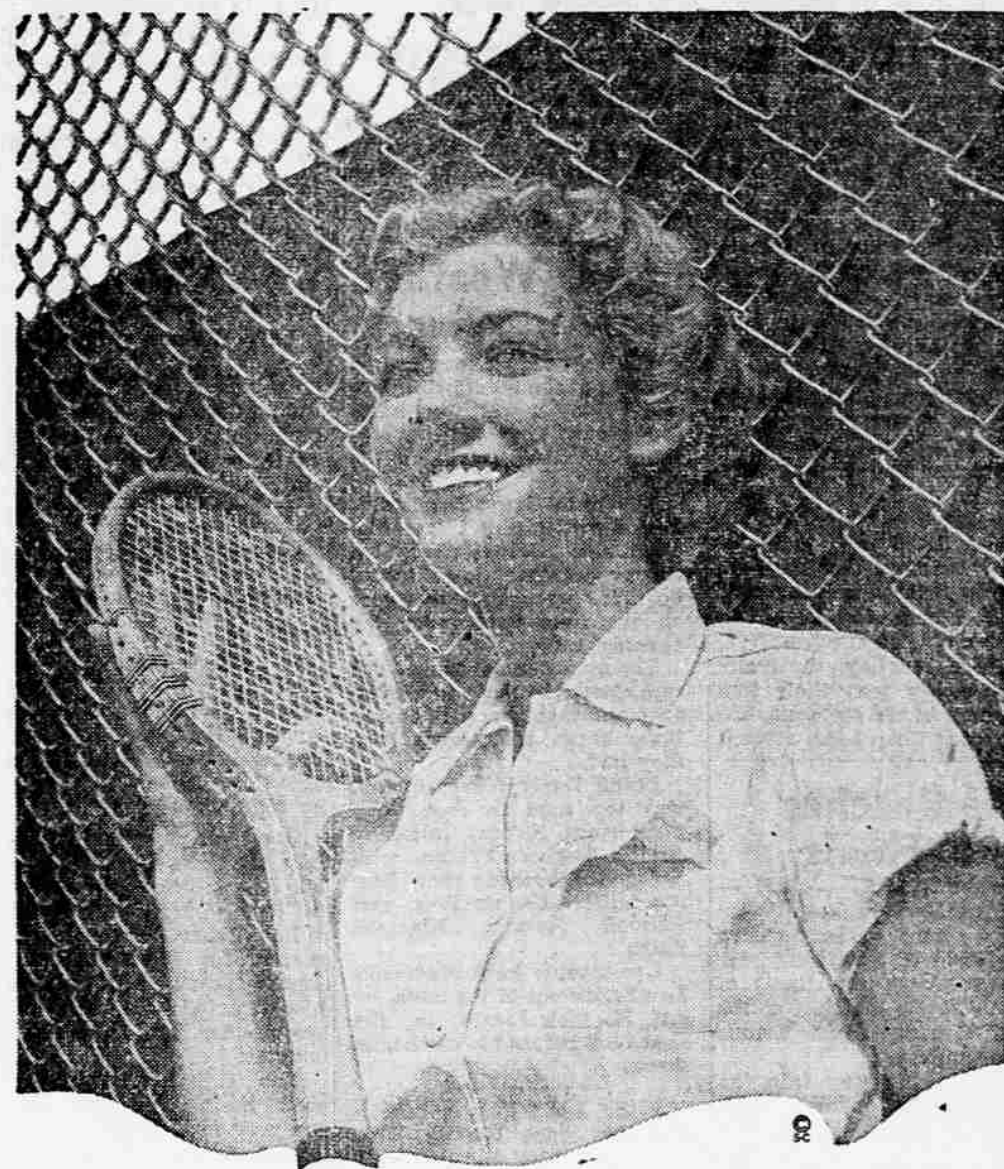
Gordon Falk, won first prize in the greased pole contest. Winners in the five divisions of the watermelon eating contest were Bobby Wright, six to eight years;

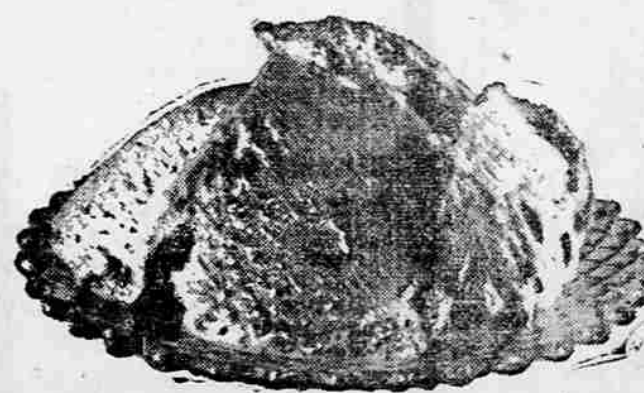
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
