## Vegetable Growers Bid to Field Day

All vegetable growers in the Rogue River valley are invited to attend the Vegetable Crops Field day at the Corvallis experiment station, August 5 at 12:30 p.m., according to C. B. Cordy, county agent in horticulture.

Cordy described this as an opportunity for vegetable growers throughout the state to visit the experiment station and see the work that is being carried on there. He explained that the vegetable department at Oregon State college has been enlarged in the last few years, and they are now conducting a lot of new experimental work. Some of the points of interest will be the vegetable insect control experiments which are being carried on in cooperation with the entomology department.

**Weed Control**  
The control of weeds in vegetable crops will also be shown. The county agent pointed out that there are a lot of new developments in the line of weed control in vegetable crops, and scientists are developing new chemicals which will kill weeds selectively — that is, they will kill out the weeds and leave the vegetables.

New methods and materials for vegetable disease control will also be shown. These tests will be carried on by the plant pathologists in cooperation with the vegetable gardening department.

There will also be demonstrations concerning vegetable variety and hybridization, and fertilizers.

## Community Club and Youth Center Sets Organization

Phoenix—An important organizational meeting for the Phoenix Community Club and Youth Center will be held Monday, August 11, 8 p.m., in the club building, according to O. E. Frazier, temporary president.

The club is now in the process of reorganization, Frazier said, and if it is to continue and operate for the benefit of this community it must have the cooperation of all.

At the annual meeting in June at which the new officers were to be elected, all nominees for the entire slate of officers declined office, forcing a postponement of election until new nominees could be obtained.

### Decline Again

At a special meeting two weeks later, the president continued, there was a repetition, all nominees declining to run. Following this, there was a lengthy discussion as to the advisability of changing the policies of the club and operating under a board of directors, composed of one member from each local club and a member of the city government. This proposed board of directors would in turn elect from its own ranks a chairman and secretary-treasurer.

Frazier said that "in this manner it was felt that the Community club would actually exist as such and be operated by the clubs who originally sponsored and organized it.

"In order to facilitate this reorganization," he continued, "and also in order to comply with existing by-laws, a group of members agreed to accept office in a temporary capacity until such reorganization could be completed." The officers are, besides Frazier, A. H. MacKintosh, vice-president; Mrs. M. O. Grove, secretary-treasurer, and Mark Norton and Leonard Halfhill, directors.

A committee has also been appointed to paint the building, plan a kitchen addition and gravel the ground in front of the structure from revenues received from the last May festival.

## Retail Food Price Up 1.2 Per Cent To Set New Record

Washington — (U.P.) — The government Friday reported retail food prices climbed 1.2 per cent in the first two weeks of July to a new record high.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics reported an 18 per cent hike in the price of eggs over the two-week period while all dairy prices rose almost 2 per cent. The increase pushed the retail food price index to 235.1 per cent of 1935-39 prices. This was 1.2 per cent above record highs set last January and again on June 30.

### Higher Than June

The bureau said food prices on July 15 were 1.5 per cent higher than a month earlier and 15.8 per cent above food costs before the Korean war.

At the same time, the bureau reported a 3-10 of one per cent increase in all wholesale prices for the week ended July 29. The increase was due to higher prices for hogs, pork, rubber, waste paper and animal feeds.

### Salem Man To Serve On Agriculture Staff

Salem — (U.P.) — E. A. "Ted" Bamford of Salem has been added to the staff of the State Department of Agriculture as chief accountant and business manager, Director E. L. Peterson said Saturday.

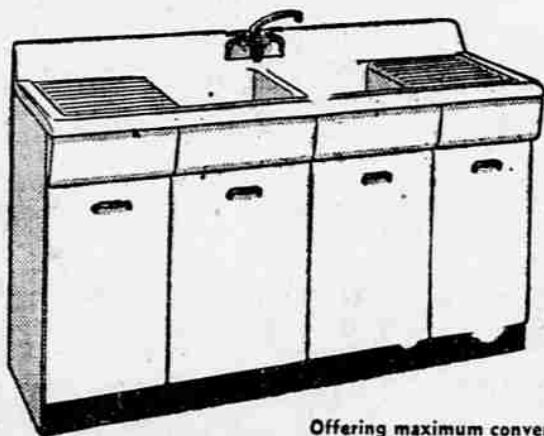
Bamford has been supervisor of the withholding department of the State Tax Commission's income division since 1948. He set up and organized the withholding tax machinery for the state.

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## Korea War Vets May Obtain Forms For Severance Pay

Salem — (U.P.) — Veterans who saw service during the Korean war emergency can now obtain forms on which to apply for mustering out pay under the Veterans Readjustment Assistance Act.

The Oregon Department of Veterans Affairs said it has reproduced a supply of the application blanks for distribution to county service officers.

**Mustering Out Pay**  
Under the terms of the new "GI bill," veterans discharged after June 27, 1950, can receive mustering out pay whether or not they received a similar payment at the end of World War II service.

Payments range from \$100 for veterans with less than 60 days' active service to \$300 for those with 60 days or more of active service, some of it outside the United States.

Payments will be made in a lump sum.

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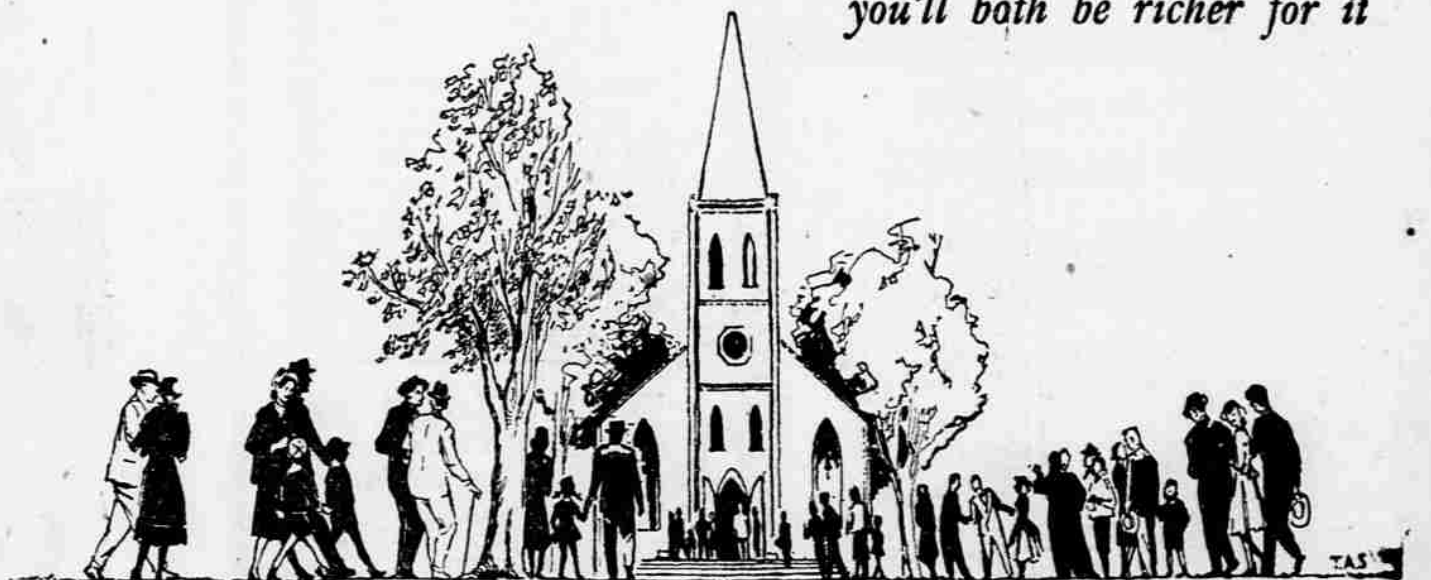
