Jacksonville—The fifth annual Gold Rush Jubilee ended yesterday evening after playing host to several thousand Rogue valley natives and visiting tourists, according to General Chairman P. E. (Scotty) Matheny.

Highpoints of the festival were the crowning of Queen Kay Carrara, Medford, on Saturday, the grand parade yesterday, Saturday evening pageant depicting the discovery of Crater lake and the gold rush treasure hunt Sunday afternoon.

Best entry in the grand parade yesterday was the float by the Jacksonville Garden club, which received \$75 prize money and \$25 for winner in the float division. The Ruth Rebekah lodge float won second place in its division, winning \$15, and first prize for the best organization or group went to the Eve Prentice accordion group (\$25), and second best in this division was won by the Jackson County Sheriff's posse and Ladies auxiliary (\$15).

Judges for the parade were County Judge J. B. Coleman, Harry Luy, J. C. Collins and E. C. Ferguson.

The winners of the Jackson County Art Association's exhibit during the Jubilee were Daniel Tesch, first; Hal Bishop, second; and Celia Clogston, third. Winner of other Sunday contests were unobtainable from Jubilee officials and Saturday's results were printed in Sunday's Mail Tribune.

British, Italian and French cars are nosing out the American models on Sunset boulevard, and this involves a new caste system.

Jaguar drivers, for example, always honk and wave at other Jaguar owners whether they know them or not. Hillman Minx owners also acknowledge other Minx drivers with a gay salute.

Jaguars, however, rarely greet Minxes, which don't cost as much.

Likewise, the owner of the pre-1949 British MG, with spoke wheels and a right-hand drive, just sniffs at a filmster who cruises about in the Americanized MG with the left-hand drive.
