Camp White Man Pleads Guilty to Disorderly Conduct

George T. Parker, Camp White, pleaded guilty yesterday in district court to a charge of disorderly conduct and will be sentenced Thursday, according to court records. Bail was set at \$500.

Parker was involved in an early Monday morning fight with cab driver Fred Warner, 318 Newtown street, and the latter was examined by doctors but not hospitalized. The complaint against Parker was signed by Warner.

Four other arraignments were held at the same time. Glen Edward Sawtelle, 20, 340 North Central avenue, pleaded guilty to a charge of petty larceny of a heater on August 2, and was sentenced to three months in the county jail, subject to application for probation.

Harry Verty Hebert, 29, Oakridge, Ore., waived preliminary hearing and was bound over to the grand jury on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses, and a \$1,500 bond was set, according to court records. Hebert is charged with passing a fictitious \$20 check at the Safeway store, 502 West Main street.

Damon Clifford Floyd, 47, route 1, box 427, Medford, pleaded innocent to a charge of disorderly conduct on Dark Hollow road, August 2, and a jury was requested by his attorney for a trial set on August 26, the court reported.

Idaho Rites Planned For Accident Victim

Remains of Norman Samuel Atwood, 25, who was killed in an accident near Briggs Camp Tuesday, will be forwarded for services and interment to Shoshone, Ida., according to Conger-Morris funeral home.

Mr. Atwood was killed when a tree fell on him. He was working with two other men loading a truck when they sat under the snag to take a break. Two of them dove to safety when the snag started to fall, but Atwood did not move in time, according to reports.

The other two, not identified here, were injured and flown to Roseburg for hospitalization. The deceased was born July 6, 1927, in White River, S. D., and was a veteran of World War II. He had been working in the woods near Briggs Camp for two months.

Survivors include his mother, Mrs. Alta Atwood, Jerome, Ida.; five brothers, Woodrow, Roy Elfred and William, all Medford, and Raymond, Boise, Ida., and a sister, Mrs. Grant Onieda, Shoshone, Ida.
