## TONSILLECTOMY HAS A HIGH MORTALITY

Miss Jane Doe, we'll call her, aged 18, died Monday while having her tonsils removed under anesthesia in the operating room at Patients' Hospital, we'll call it. Dr. John Doe, we'll call him, deputy coroner, said the cause was difficult to determine without an autopsy and that no one could be blamed for the death.

The item is quoted from a newspaper report, except the identifying names.

A medical colleague sends it, with this comment:

"How right you are in your teachings... This time the cause was difficult to determine. The girl, aged 18, was too old for the scapegoat thymus or status thymicolymphaticus."

The coroner's deputy didn't know the cause of death, but he knew no one could be blamed for the girl's death.

That may be so, if there was no alternative for the major operation. I wonder how the doctor or doctors who advised the girl to submit to tonsillectomy felt about it.

For that matter, I wonder how any doctor who has figured in such a tragedy feels about it. Once again I tell the world

there is a comparatively safe alternative for tonsillectomy in most instances, namely tonsillectomy, which means instantaneously slicing off the obstructing portion of the tonsil, a procedure which requires only local anesthesia. Tonsillectomy was formerly the standard method of "removing" tonsils. It went out of fashion only because the modern trick specialists, the everready operators invented the slogan "get all the tonsil"—as though tonsil tissue in itself is harmful. With this wicked, unscientific invention, the ever-

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## Factory Lay-Offs In Slight Decline

Washington — (U.P.) — Factory lay-offs declined slightly during June despite the nationwide steel strike, the Labor Department reported Tuesday.

The department's Bureau of Labor Statistics said factories laid off 10 workers per 1,000 employed during June, compared to 11 in the previous month. It explained that large steel inventories, laid in before the steel strike, "allowed virtually uninterrupted production in most manufacturing plants during the month."

Such defense-related industries or ordinance, metals, electrical machinery and instruments even reported fewer layoffs than the previous month. Soft goods industries, including food, textiles, apparel and leather, also had fewer layoffs.

ready operators stampeded the dumb rank and file of the profession into wholesale tonsil and adenoid operations which amounted to wholesale malpractice in the early decades of this century.

As for the treatment of infected tonsils, it is my belief and advice that one subject to any trouble ascribed to infected tonsils should choose electro-coagulation (diathermy) treatment at the hands of a physician skilled in this method. It is safe, whether the subject is a good risk for surgery or not, and so far as I can learn by long study and observation, it gives results at least as good as any one can expect from radical surgery.
