All he cares about are his friends and past-times. It's awful to be unwanted and unwanted at my age. Is that the way a man of my age acts? What should I do before the rest of my life is ruined?"

(A) If you were 18 instead of 48, your husband might act differently toward you. But you can't turn back time. Chances are he will continue to act as he is now for the rest of his life. Men in the sixties are usually reverting to childish behavior in one form or another. They become forgetful or unreasonable, or they lack emotional warmth. Invariably they are self-centered.

Your husband is showing old age in his behavior. All that really matters to him are his own comforts. 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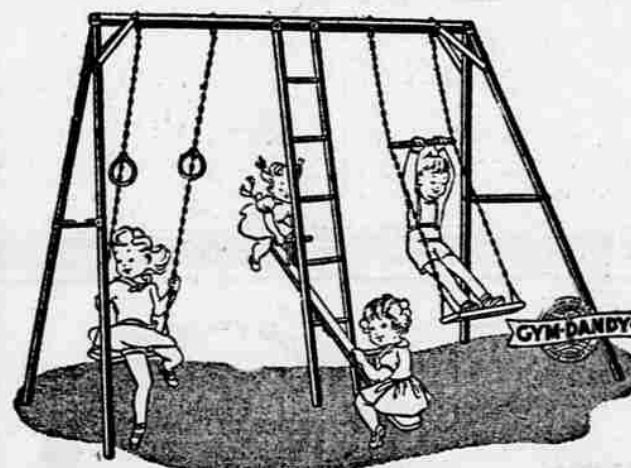
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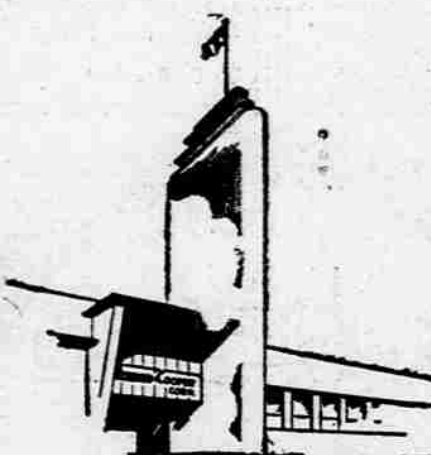
