Clinton Smith was chairman of the judging committee. Members of the society took turns at serving as hosts and hostesses for the exhibit, and they report that the audience was "very appreciative." Signing the guest register at the show were 826 people, and members of the society said that many who attended failed to sign it.

Guests from several states outside of Oregon were present, and one couple attending, Mr. and Mrs. Ray Pederson, were from Oslo, Norway. Also there were people from Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, Louisiana, Idaho, Washington and California.

The show opened at 10 a.m. Saturday with the Jubilee queen officially opening the doors by cutting a ribbon. The display continued through Sunday.

Water Main Installation On Western Avenue Given Approval of City Council

Following a public hearing at which five citizens voiced objection, the city council last night voted for the installation of a trunk water main on Western avenue between West Main street and Sunset avenue.

Several persons on Western avenue objected that they are already connected to another

main and are satisfied with the service they are receiving from it. Mayor Diamond Flynn pointed out that some people in the area have complained of insufficient water pressure and that this main would prevent that.

The ordinance calling for assessment for the main passed the council unanimously.

Paving Bid Accepted

The council also awarded the contract for paving of Taylor street, from Myrtle street one block to the end of the street, to E. C. Conrad. The bid was read as the last council meeting but was not accepted because it was more than 10 per cent above the engineer's estimate.

A poll of property owners on the street — there are only two — showed they favored going ahead with the paving. Conrad's bid was \$1,517.20.

A similar poll of people living along an alley in the New-town addition showed they were opposed to having the alley paved at the price offered by Conrad, the lowest bidder. Seven voted for the paving, seven against and five refused to vote.

Those who didn't vote were considered opposed, and the bids for the project were rejected.

Zone Change Approved

Following another public hearing the council voted to change the north side of West Jackson street between Holly and Woodstock streets from a residential to a commercial zone.

Councilman Harold Frye said he opposed the change to Zone 3B because it would do away with setback lines, but he voted with the majority in favor of the rezoning. The vote was unanimous.

Evergreen bus lines were given permission to give temporary bus service to the camp for Mexican workers on Table Rock road. The company will operate 25-cent service from the camp to Medford until the camp is closed down at the end of the fruit season.

City Attorney Frank P. Farrell was asked if he was yet able to report on his study of hedges and whether or not they should be classified under city law as fences and be subject to the same restrictions. He said he would be prepared to advise the council at the next meeting.

The council authorized installation of two new lights in Hawthorne park, south of Main street. The expense is expected to be \$175.

Survey Ordered

The superintendent's office was ordered to survey the re-grassing on Pennsylvania avenue parking strips following completion of a recent paving project. Mrs. Allien Maxwell, 504 Pennsylvania avenue, objected to the job the contractor had done. She said her parking that had been replanted was coming up all weeds, and the driveway was not joined properly to the street.

Mayor Flynn said it is the duty of the city to see that these jobs are properly done.

Western Oil and Burner company was awarded the bid for delivery of fuel oil for the airport and park departments. Western's bid was the lowest of the two offered.

The council meeting was adjourned until Friday noon when problems relating to a new fire district will be considered. (See Story Page 1)

Casket Revalued; Assessment Too High

Burlington, Colo.—(U.P.)—Jim Gernhart, who has held two annual "funerals" for himself to make sure he isn't "buried like a dog," allowed Wednesday his fancy coffin didn't cost \$4,000 after all.

That was the value Gernhart placed on the casket when he held his first funeral in 1951. So Kit Carson County Assessor Park Guthrie slipped a personal property assessment on the casket based on that figure.

The State Tax Commission received a letter from the 76-year-old Gernhart. It seems he "overestimated" the cost. Actually, Gernhart wrote, the coffin cost only \$1,250 and he had a receipt to prove it.
