'Price Tags' Placed On Four Measures Due To Be on State Ballot

Salem —(U.P.)— "Price tags" have been placed on four measures slated to appear on the November ballot and have been filed in the secretary of state's office.

A three-man board has agreed on the costs and the gains in revenue that would result from voter approval of the measures.

The "price tags" on the ballot are required by a new law passed by the 1951 legislature so that voters will have a more accurate idea what their votes will do to

the state budget.

Board Members Named

The price estimates were reached by a board composed of Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry, State Treasurer Walter J. Pearson and Budget Director Vern Young.

Fred Paulus, assistant state treasurer, acted in the absence of Pearson and concurred in the decisions of the board.

approved, yield \$4,900,000 to the state annually. A fair trades act, tied in with the cigarette tax, to become operative if the tax is imposed, would raise an additional \$110,000 in license fees, the board estimated. The fair trade measure provides for a \$5 annual license fee for retail dealers and a fee of \$250 a year for distributors.

Hospital Costs Estimated

The board estimated that the proposed hospital for the aged, to be located within a 20-mile radius of Portland, would cost \$3,000,000 to build and \$750,000 a year to operate. The board based its figure on the cost of operation on an estimated 500 patients who would require almost constant care at a per capita cost of \$125 a month.

The hospital measure was referred to the voters by the last legislature.

A measure providing for tonnage fees for trucks, passed by the 1951 legislature but referred to the people by referendum petitions sponsored by large truck operators, would provide an additional \$1,900,000 annually in highway funds, the board figured.

The proposed school reorganization bill, referred to the voters after the bill had passed the legislature, would, according to the board, cost the state \$60,000 a year for three years.

Gold Hill Hears Highway Junction Will Be Changed

Gold Hill—A report that the State Highway Commission has already take steps to move the junction of Highway 234 (Sams Valley highway) a way from Gold Hill was made Monday night at the city council meeting.

George Turner, city superintendent, stated that he had received reliable information that the state has purchased some property from the Wendell Applin place in back of the Whispering Pines church on Blackwell hill, for a cloverleaf to make a junction of Highway 234 with Highway 99.

Previously Denied

At a council meeting several months ago, W. G. Stuntz, right of way agent for the highway commission, had reassured the councilmen that no such plan was contemplated, that the terrain in that vicinity would make such a project almost impossible, that the state had already purchased right of way along the present 234 route practically to the Gold Hill city limits, and that if the route should be changed this money would be wasted. These statements were repeated by several councilmen, who all agreed that Stuntz had made them. The council decided that it would be useless to attempt to stop such a move, as their previous attempt to keep Gold Hill from being by-passed by Highway 99 had failed.

A letter from the American La France Corporation in New York stated that the 500 gallon pumper fire truck ordered for the city of Gold Hill had been shipped by freight July 30 and should arrive here about August 12.

Glen Kincaid appeared in regard to a letter the council had sent him about a violation of the city building code, in that he was using as living quarters a building erected under a permit to construct a storage shed. Kincaid stated that the property was in litigation and that the court had refused him permission to live in the unoccupied house on the premises. The council granted him 30 days in which to attempt to get the matter straightened out with the court.

Okey Fund Use

A letter from the State Highway Commission authorized the use of the city's share of state funds for surfacing Sixth avenue. George Turner stated the grading of the street had been completed. The council decided to have gravel spread on the surface now, and to wait until next spring to do the surfacing, so that the street could settle.

Arrangements were made to have a new water main laid from the reservoir down to Sixth avenue. It was tentatively planned to lay the new pipe one day next week. Residents will be notified in the newspapers about the hours the water will be turned off. It was also planned to have the trench dug at the same time for extending the sewer lines to homes at the west end of Fifth avenue.

A letter received from the State Highway Commission in answer to a request from the council that the state take over and maintain Ben Hur Lampman park, asked if the city would object to a change of name for the park, since it is not the policy to name state parks after a person unless the land for the park has been donated by the person. The council planned to write an answer, giving its reasons for wishing the present name of the park kept, but that they would concede this point if absolutely necessary.

It was reported that small children were roaming the streets of Gold Hill until late hours at night, or were left in automobiles parked outside taverns. Turner was instructed to consult county juvenile authorities about the problem.

Memorial Services To Honor Sgt. Noud

Sgt. William P. Noud, the son of Thomas P. Noud, Route 2, will be honored in a special memorial service of the Disabled American Veterans national convention at Boston next Monday. Sgt. Noud was killed in Korea, where he served in the marine corps.

A prayer will be offered in Sgt. Noud's name to symbolize all the Medford area servicemen who died in the Korean campaign.

Names were chosen at random from government casualty lists, according to the DAV. The names represent hundreds of communities in every section of the country and will be part of a huge memorial wreath.

National Commander Ewing W. Mays will preside at the convention. He has just returned from an extensive tour of Korea and will report to the convention on his visit to the battle fronts and hospitals.

Mustering Out Pay Regulations Told

Regulations and procedures governing mustering-out payments authorized by the recently enacted Veterans Readjustment act were announced today by the defense department.

Any men below the grade of major or lieutenant commander who were honorably discharged from active duty after June 26, 1950, are eligible for the payments. The law provides for payment of \$100 to veterans with less than 60 days active service, \$200 for those with no foreign service and \$300 for veterans with 60 days service, part of which was served outside the territorial United States.

To receive the payment a veteran must submit the original of his separation report with his application.

The mustering payment may be collected by the immediate family of an eligible serviceman who dies before collecting any of the payment.

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
