More Sanitation For Rogue River Is Council's Aim

Rogue River—During the city council meeting Tuesday evening, Mayor Fred Dengler stated it has been suggested that sanitary conditions in Rogue River be improved, and he called attention to the citation by the State Sanitation Authority, of the ten Oregon cities accused of refusing to cooperate in the state's post-war anti-stream pollution campaign.

It was stated an ordinance had been passed in 1947 requiring all property owners in the City of Rogue River to install septic tanks. The council decided to appeal to the citizens for compliance as soon as possible.

Fines Are Few
Chief of Police W. J. Peters reported he has issued only 20 tickets in the past two months. He stated his gasoline bill exceeded the \$10 allowance set by the council and it was voted to pay for all gasoline used in city work.

Two city employees petitioned to be placed under social security.

The council voted to allow full time employees a week's vacation with pay after one year service and two weeks vacation at the end of the second year.

Howard Miller, chairman of the building committee, reported plastering of the new city hall would begin Wednesday.

The grand jury's report on the safety of the Rogue River bridge was read.

Harry Rose, senior councilman tendered his resignation at the end of the meeting. No appointment was made to fill the vacancy.

Mexico Will Ship Cattle to States

Washington—(U.P.)—Mexico is expected to ship about 500,000 head of cattle into this country during the first 12 months after the opening of the border on Sept. 1, Agriculture Department experts said Thursday.

They said a shift in Mexican cattle operations and restrictions imposed by the Mexican government will cause a change in the type of cattle coming in, and will reduce the volume after the first year.

The lifting of the embargo—in effect since a 1946 epidemic of foot-and-mouth disease in Mexico—was contingent on no further outbreaks south of the border.

Great Pyramid Builder's Identity May Be Hidden

Cairo, Egypt—(U.P.)—The Great Pyramid of Cheops at Giza, one of the "seven wonders" of the world may not really have been built by the Pharaoh Cheops, one researcher thinks.

He suspects that perhaps behind the massive stones of that pyramid may be a sealed and yet undiscovered chamber which will reveal the true identity of the builder of the greatest edifice of its kind in the world to serve as his tomb.

The answers to his questions are likely to bring to light truths and treasures so far unsuspected by even the greatest Egyptologists, says Kenneth C. Dick, a free lance archeologist from New York.

He is so intrigued by the fact that the "so-called" Pyramid of Cheops has an internal arrangement different from any other pyramid, that he even suspects it was not built by the ancient Egyptians at all but possibly by some other ancient people who conquered Egypt.

Scents Treasure
Dick is in Egypt to attempt to unfold what he thinks is the hidden story of the Great Pyramid. He says Egyptology needs "a lot of straightening out" and is convinced that some of the greatest treasures of ancient Egypt are still to be found. He said:

"I cannot accept the theories advanced in the past about the identity of the man who built the Great Pyramid because they are based on mere assumption and do not rest on conclusive evidence."

"In fact, there is a symbol available—no, it is a vase, a cartouche or a—say that Cheops was the builder. Yet there has been no one to challenge that assumption."

"I am not trying to tear down theories evinced before me, but to reconstruct the facts. In the process of doing this I must pull out a few loose stones and some Egyptologists are bound not to be pleased. But for progress sacrifice must be made."

The sandy-haired, 39-year-old archeologist draws a clue from the sarcophagus lying in the "king's chamber" of the Great Pyramid. He said:

"That sarcophagus is a puzzle. Here is a tremendous monument, and in it the lowliest sarcophagus of those times you can imagine. It does not lend itself to the magnificence of the monument. Its crudeness indicates rather that it may have served to bury a monkey but certainly not a king."

What is now known as the "king's chamber" was perhaps originally designed by the genial builder of the pyramid as a pressure chamber to relieve part of the weight of the colossal monument on the limestone floor whereon it stands, Dick said.

He believes it is very likely that a sealed and undetected chamber may be found within the pyramid worthy perhaps of being called the "king's chamber" than the present one, and with a sarcophagus more fitting to receive the body of a king than the present "stone box."

Dick asked the research departments of 16 American engineering firms, "as well as the U. S. Atomic Energy commission at Oak Ridge" by what means they could detect a new chamber in the pyramid. "They stated that no known instrumentation has yet been devised that will detect the presence of sealed chambers on so large a scale," he said.

Dick has arranged to undertake the detection of the new chamber with a group of French scientists from an engineering firm in Paris. He said their main tests will consist of electro-magnetic readings into the granite and limestone of the pyramid.
