Juvenile Department Handles 99 Cases

The Jackson County Juvenile department handled 99 cases during July, it was announced today.

There were 32 new cases last year. One case was transferred from another jurisdiction and the rest were carried over from June. The department closed 37 cases and transferred two to other jurisdictions, so 60 cases were carried into August.

Four of the juveniles were detained in jail. Two more were committed to private institutions and two to private agencies for foster home care. Nine were given shelter care.

The department had 12 court hearings, 212 office interviews and 126 visits.
